


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Interim Pastor's Report

May, 2018

Interim Senior Pastor

I began serving Grace as interim senior pastor on January 23. I'm grateful to Pastor Sara Vanderpan for serving as "bridge interim senior pastor" from November 27 to January 22. And I'm grateful for the congregation's willingness to wait which



allowed me to fill this position. I'm truly enjoying getting to know the people of Grace in worship and in other gatherings. I greatly appreciate the staff and congregational leaders I'm privileged to work with. And I look forward to helping guide Grace through this interim time.

2017 was a year of major staff transition for Grace. Pastor Mark Hellmann highlighted some of these in his annual report last May. But then Pastor Mark and Jeannie Hellmann retired in November after serving Grace for 22 years. With all these staff departures, along with new staff coming on board, Grace has been in major transition now for a full year since Pastor Steve Thomason's resignation last spring, when he left to accept a call to another church. Pastor Steve's departure was a big loss for many people. From what I've observed, it seems that perhaps the congregation didn't grieve the loss of Pastor Steve in the way it may have needed to. Confusion around questions like "Why aren't we forming a Call Committee for a new associate pastor?" weren't clarified until Pastor Mark's and Jeannie's retirement announcement in the fall. In the span of less than a year, in 2017 Grace lost its entire pastoral staff, along with losing other staff members. That's a lot of loss and change. That's no small amount of grief.

This kind of grief may manifest itself in the struggle of some people to adjust. Evidence of this struggle are those who have been absent in worship in recent months. While it's too bad when people step away from their congregation during such times of transition, it happens. Some will wait to see if and when they may return to Grace. Some will wait to see who the new pastor will be. Some have and will continue to come back to check things out.

I know that Grace can remember higher overall weekend worship attendance numbers not many years ago. Compared to those peak attendance years, current levels are lower. It's also true that the Church and the culture continue to change even as I write this. But despite all these realities, I want to emphasize that Grace still has "critical mass" and a lot of vitality. Grace is a congregation that still has many people active in its life and mission. So please know that the Holy Spirit has not left Grace, that Grace's life and mission will continue during this interim, and that Grace can have a strong future, even if that future may look somewhat different than its past. The Alban Institute says that congregations become "unstuck" during interim times. They are given an opportunity to take a fresh and honest look at themselves, their mission, and their future. While some anxiety or unresolved tensions may float to the surface, they are also freed in positive ways to creatively look at new possibilities.

Grace has now formed a Transition Team which held its first meeting on April 30. The eight members are: Lori Ackerson, Chuck Donaldson, Kevin Gast, Johnna Rohmer-Hirt, Nancy Jenkins, Ann Lange, Sue Melody, and Mike Seide. The team has a good demographic mix of age, gender, recent vs. longtime membership, and worship service (5:00, 8:00, 9:00, 10:30) normally attended. I'll be the 9th member of this team as I work closely with them in my role as pastoral advisor and consultant.

Together we'll look at Grace and the surrounding community. We'll ask questions about who Grace is, who Grace wants to be, what we see as Grace's mission and future trajectory, and what kind of skill set is needed in Grace's new senior pastor. Congregational input will be an important part of the Transition Team's process.

The Transition Team's work will take about six months from start until the final report they present to the Vision Board and Call Committee. Then the Call Committee will begin their work. A typical Call Committee timeline – from first meeting until the new pastor arrives – is about nine months. So, for example, if Grace's Call Committee begins their work in November, the new pastor could be on board before September 2019. It could be sooner, or it could be a later. The important thing is that Grace makes its way through this process thoughtfully and intentionally.

Can't Grace just quickly get a new senior pastor? Usually taking a pause for the cause is healthiest and best for a church in the long run – especially after a 22 year pastorate. This is what many congregational studies have shown. This has been my experience as an interim pastor. And that was the experience of Salem English Lutheran Church in Minneapolis where I was the pastor who left after 20 years. It's probably not wise for Grace to rush to get its new pastor before the congregation really knows who it's looking for. It will also be important during this interim time to review Grace's current staffing configuration, look at the roles and responsibilities of each staff member, and at least consider future staffing possibilities that may best fit Grace's size and needs.

Finally, an intentional interim time can also be a very spiritual time when we are open to the way the Holy Spirit may be at work within us and our congregation. Even as our personal faith journeys need continual renewal and re-birth, so does our life together as a faith community. May the Spirit actively work within and among us during our interim sojourn together at Grace! – *Pastor Bruce Arnevik*

Our last Summer Musical Camp was especially precious and poignant. Our musical was **Once Upon a Parable**. Our musical allowed us to explore the parables in our weeklong adventure. We created a flood as we sang about the Wiseman Foolish Man. We had many actors AND actresses cast in the role of Jesus. Our musical was a very powerful journey of salvation as we met the prodigal, in our play a daughter, and ended with Jesus's death and resurrection.

We had a cast of 27 brilliant actors and actresses who sang from their hearts to praise God. We had a crew of 8 caring and talented individuals who made this production possibly. Summer Musical Camp has given children amazing opportunities and allowed youth to serve and grow in leadership. Each year, the cast have grown in confidence and ability and it has been a joy to see the steps each of them has made as they have grown!

SONday School

This year the children have studied a different Bible story each week, that relates back to the Bible verse they are learning for the month. Each grade has spent the year learning and memorizing faith milestones. These allow them to grow deeper in their relationship with God. Preschoolers are learning how to love their neighbors by memorizing Mark 12:31. Kindergarteners are learning about eternal life by memorizing John 3:16. First Graders have spent the year memorizing the Lord's Prayer. Second Grade is learning all the books of the New Testament. While Third and Fourth Grade have been learning the books of the Old Testament. Finally, our Fifth Graders have memorized the Apostles Creed and are excited to recite it with the entire congregation in church. Our fifth graders are also getting ready to make an important step and cross the bridge from SONday school to catechism.

In the fall of 2017, we learned about choices the men and women of the Bible made to follow God and lead faithful lives. Our next unit let us study stories told by a great story teller, Jesus. We ended our year with RKBC's Greatest Hits, where we sang many of the songs we used in our weekly worships since October 2010.

Trunk or Treat

The Grace community opened their trunks for the first annual Trunk or Treat in the parking lot on October 25, 2017. With the theme "Shine with the



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Light of Jesus", children and youth were able to dress up and collect candy and goodies during this family friendly event. More than 20 vehicle trunks were included, and God's shining light blessed the event with wonderful weather. The smiles were contagious and grace was shared by all. This event was able to bring children, families and guests together in a light-hearted way.

What the Elf Knew – an Off-the-Shelf Christmas Pageant

This year, Jen Bobbe, a member of Grace wrote and directed the Christmas Program. She worked hard to bring this story to life with a modern twist, while maintaining the true reason for Christmas. The program explained the real Christmas story of Christ's birth to two children from an Elf on the Shelf that comes to life. The program had 25 actors and actresses from grade's second-fifth, along with 40 plus SONday *school* students singing Christmas songs throughout the performance.

The Annual Easter Eggstravaganza packed the Fellowship Hall again this year and brought joy to many children. We had 100 children in attendance with their parents. The children started by learning to make crosses with their palm branches, viewing what the last supper might have been like, and visiting the empty tomb of Jesus. This past year we started composting in all of our classrooms. One of our parents is a farmer and he helped us get started. We are showing the children how to give back to the Earth God has created for us. In the Spring, when the weather finally warms up, Farmer Justin is going to bring us some of the compost for our gardens. In addition, our playground became a Certified Wildlife Habitat by the National Wildlife Federation. We earned this recognition because of our conscientious planning, landscaping and sustainable gardening where wildlife will find quality habitat for food, water, and cover. In the Preschool Classroom, we added a cool loft for the children that includes a dramatic play area and a reading nook. One of our past Dads, whose daughter started in our toddler room and now joins us for our summer camp as a school-ager, spent an afternoon putting the loft together for us.

We have another exciting summer camp planned this year filled with fun, friends and faith. Our theme is a Jungle Safari, "Where Adventure Awaits." This year we will be "Explor'n" some exciting destinations. Every week will be a new adventure! In June we are going to the Wildlife Science Center to see Minnesota's largest wolf pack. It is also home to black bears, foxes, lynx, raccoons and birds of prey. In July we will enjoy the musical adventure of "Madagascar" at Stages Theatre. We're also going on a colorful adventure to the Crayola Experience at MOA. In August we will go on a swing'n safari at Hyland Park's Chutes and Ladders and splish splash at a brand new splash pad in Coon Rapids.

We feel very blessed to have so many amazing families as part of our Golden Rule family. We currently have 57 children enrolled in our program both full and part time. We have a wonderful opportunity to share God's love with our children and help them grow and learn through our childcentered curriculum, caring staff and nurturing Christian environment. Youth Ministries

After Christmas we continued our understanding of God's promises by **remembering** our Baptism and **renewing** our faith weekly through Holy Communion. Our small group leaders worked to provide discussions, activities, prayer and leadership so students could engage in these topics deeply. Pastor Bruce Arnevik joined us for class twice and is looking forward to being more involved in Catechism in the future!



Connection Events

Over fifty students (and several fearless adults) spent a weekend at the Fall Recharge at Okoboji Lutheran Bible Camp in November. This was an excellent week of deepening friendships and spiritual formation. Over forty students also gathered for the Ultimate Lock-In in Maple Grove where they were able to connect to new friends from multiple churches in the area. Students swam, ice skated, played games, ate pizza, danced, and sang until the sun came up! On a smaller scale, students met as small groups throughout the year. Each small group meets twice for a service project and twice for a fellowship opportunity. One opportunity for students was to roll bandages made of white fabric strips for Global Health Ministries to be sent all over the globe to developing countries in need of health care supplies.

Summer stretch was back at it with 50 middle school students servicing and connecting with new and old friends all over the city! We also had 10 devoted high school students as

Junior Leaders who helped mentor the younger students by leading them in Bible Studies, helping to carry out the day to day tasks and befriending students. High School

Own Your Faith

OYF is designed to give high school freshmen one additional year following catechism to process their faith questions with an individual mentor in preparation for Confirmation. Twenty-seven students worked diligently with their mentors in monthly one-on-one sessions throughout the school year. Students participated by watching a monthly video that allowed the students and mentors to interact with the topics and questions in their own time and space. The discussions were rich and both the students and the mentors learned about God's promise and their faith. The year ended with a wonderful weekend of **Confirmation where students and their families remembered their Baptism, rejoiced in their faith, and renewed their commitment to God and our church.**

High School Ministry

High School Ministry at Grace was in a wonderful time of renewal this year. Students embraced new programs and worked to make them their own. Our new Youth Group meets twice a month (1st and 3rd Tuesday of the month at 7:00) for fellowship and Bible Study surrounding topics relevant to student's lives and the world around us. This year we have explored relationships, mental health, social justice, homelessness, and community. We also started monthly fellowship events adventuring all over the twin cities. High School students at Grace are vital part of our congregation's ministry and their contributions reach far outside the youth room. They can also be found at outreach events, taking adult education classes, serving as ushers, lending their musical talents, traveling to Haiti, and fostering the faith of younger students as SONday School and Rockin' Kids Club leaders, nursery workers, and VBS leaders. They are a wonderful asset to our church and we are so blessed to have such a wonderful group of young people being the church.

Special Events

Once again our mission trip master, Tom Baker, coordinated two amazing mission trips for our middle school and our high school students to help them better understand how God is at work in two communities. First, 15 middle school students and 3 adults journeyed to Milwaukee, WI to meet



and serve our neighbors to the east. In July, 20 high school students and 4 adult leaders traveled to the south side of Chicago. In both trips students learned about how racial divides break trust in communities and how poverty, gang violence and resource disparity impact these areas.

In both locations, we worked with preexisting organizations that work to build bridges in the community and provide food, child care, housing, and hope in these neighborhoods. Students also spent time visiting with local senior citizens, children, adults with special needs, and people experiencing homelessness. We were welcomed with open arms in both communities and learned and gained much more than we gave. Both mission teams experienced deep spiritual, emotional, and relational growth. A heartfelt "Thank You" to the staff, parents, and congregation members who lent their time, talent and finances to make these two memorable trips a reality.

As the Director of Youth and Family Ministries I want say thank you to the entire congregation for continually supporting our youth and their desire to grow in their faith and serve the community. Without the generous monetary gifts of the congregation, adult leaders and prayers of all of you we would not be able to do what we do. Thank you for your support.

SALT

SALT (Seek, Abide, Love, Trust) is a prayer and adult education ministry of Grace. *The purpose of the SALT ministry is to provide opportunities for God to transform hearts and minds,* by these means: 1) encourage prayer for the church, the world and all those in need; 2) seek, plan and implement adult Christian education opportunities; 3) serve as a catalyst and resource for Grace ministries. We meet on the third Thursday of every month, or as arranged to another date. We have seven members with three year terms based on calendar years. January 1 is the beginning date for new members, and a leader is chosen in January of each year.

In the past year the SALT ministry has transformed from its beginning in 2016 as a "spiritual formation team". Faith & Community Partnership with Sand Creek Elementary

This is a Grace Team of 7 people who share the work, but each have responsibilities of leading the special projects.

School year 2017-2018

- Collected school supplies during August (with our 'Grab 2' project).
- Contributed/added \$3,513.80 to the "Little Bit of Grace" fund at Sand Creek from Octoberfest and the Grace Bazaar.
- Extra benevolence funds of \$2,400 given to us in January 2018 is being used for: One half for The Sheridan Story Project; and one half for reimbursement of Grace volunteer expenses.
- The above money contributions are also used to fund The Sheridan Story Project for 20 students. The Sheridan Story project supplies food to families in need every Friday (food for over the weekend) put into the child's backpack. The food is user friendly for the children to open, heat and eat on their own if no adult is available. It includes all the food groups to keep it healthy but also appealing to children.
- Purchased and delivered Food Baskets to families in need for holidays and spring break.
- Food Gift Cards purchase and delivered at Easter for 10 families.
- Adopt A Family at Christmas for 11 families.
- Cut, prepared for tying, and delivered fleece fabric for 10 adult and 6 child size blankets.
- Created 30 red heart-shaped felt pocket reminders/ gifts for students missing a parent.
- Purchased and delivered individual snacks for students in need.
- Staff Appreciation encouraging notes with treats for 100 Sand Creek staff throughout the year:
- Donation of \$200.00 for Math related games for children needing extra math skills help.

June year end Staff Appreciation lunch will be delivered on the last day for teachers.

Family Table Meal

On the third Sunday of each month, volunteers prepare and serve a complimentary and nutritious evening meal for the those in need within our community.



Family Promise in Anoka County

Is an, inter-denominational organization, committed to addressing the issue of family homelessness in Anoka County. This past year, Family Promise in Anoka County, with the help of over 900 volunteers from 19 congregations, has helped 20 families, 74 people, 47 of them under the age of 12.

72 Grace Members hosted these children and their families for one full week during four different weeks last year. During those weeks Grace opened its doors to welcome our neighbors who are experiencing homelessness. We provided these families with nutritious evening meals and a safe place to spend the night. At the end of the week each person was presented with a Quilt provided by the Grace quilters as a parting gift.

This year Family Promise has initiated their "Home for Keeps" program. In this program, distressed mobile home units are purchased and refurbished. Prospective families are placed in these units. After one year of working with case workers and demonstrating their ability for home management they will be given ownership of the unit. Family Promise has hired a second case worker. His job will be to work in an outreach capacity. He will work with families before they enter the program to insure greater potential for success. And to work with families after they leave the program.

We would like to thank you for choosing Family Promise in Anoka County to be the recipient of your gifts of time and service. We are grateful for your partnership and support of our program. We would not be able to do what we do without you.

Feed My Starving Children (FMSC)

Grace provided over 1000 volunteer shifts this past year and packed more than 280,000 meals which is an entire shipping container of food for kids! Grace had a very successful marathon pack in November 2017 and has scheduled another marathon pack for a weekend in November 2018. Additionally, Grace Lutheran Church and its members donated \$9500 towards FMSC meals. The need at FMSC continues to grow with their fiscal year goal to pack 1 million meals per day!



Outreach Ministries—Continued

Global Health Ministries

Grace volunteers bring their willing hands and feet to this local ministry which sorts medical donations, then sends supplies to Lutheran hospitals and medial missionaries around the world. Volunteers also help roll bandages, load supplies onto semi-trucks, and sort supplies.

Grace2Haiti & Our Abandoned Children

We had 5 members of Grace travel to Haiti in January to continue the construction of the medical clinic and the home for abandoned kids. In April, 21 more people went to Haiti and we made further progress with the medical clinic, the home for the abandoned kids, the 2nd fresh water well, the two community bath houses, drain field and septic, and Robin's Nest (the sewing building). It is amazing to see the progress that has occurred since our first trip to Haiti in 2012. God is alive and well! The most amazing part is how God works on our hearts and minds when we are in Haiti. We need to do an official count, but we are awfully close to having sent 20 teams to Haiti since 2012! Stay tuned because we are starting the planning process for our 2019 trips! If you have ever thought about coming with us, now is the time!

Grace4Rakai Ministry Update



Grace4Rakai Ministry at Grace continues to provide critical support for many outreach ministries in Rakai, Uganda. The new ACT Junior School opened in January 2018 and welcomed 516 new students to the school. The "Grace Wing" is now a dormitory for 120 young girls. The Grace Quilters have lovingly provided more than 80 quilts for the beds in this dormitory with more in production. The school is in need of textbooks and additional sponsors to support children at the school. Our community of Grace now provides sponsorship of 105 children in need in Rakai. Some of the younger children are in the new school and many others are preparing for high school and university. We hope to establish a scholarship fund so that our sponsored children can attend university in the future. The Amazing Grace Bakery now operates 24/7 and employs 50+ people. They dream of expanding the bakery in 2018 to meet the growing demand for "fresh bread" in Rakai! Praise God for all He is doing in Rakai, and how our Grace community impacts the lives of people there!

Grace Quilters

Over 300 beautiful quilts were lovingly created and given to local hospitals, shelters, hospice care, foster care, teen moms, Family Promise and more.

So far, 77 quilts have been sent to the precious children of Rakai for the dormitories in their new school. Many of the children receiving quilts are sponsored by members of Grace. There are about 300 students that sleep at the school, so we have some work to do.

Habitat for Humanity



July 2017 Grace had several volunteers serve through Habitat for Humanity for a build in Blaine, MN. This provided affordable housing for a family in need. The family was set to take ownership just before Christmas as a surprise from the father who was onsite everyday helping build their home.

Grace's Outreach Ministry is currently working with Habitat for Humanity and Thrivent to find a build date for the 2018 year.

HOPE 4 Youth

HOPE 4 Youth is a nonprofit organization situated in Anoka that seeks to provide pathways to end youth homelessness. The drop-in center is open five days a week and provides food, clothing, educational resources, and housing possibilities. Thanks to various groups at Grace, the youth have received numerous food and hygiene items plus one group also furnished a warm meal for the youth. A hot,



nutritious meal is provided every weekday so it is our hope that more groups would volunteer in that capacity. Our residential expansion, called HOPE Place, located by Northtown, has also received donations and quilts from the Grace Quilters. A heartfelt

thank you for the financial support from Grace that has helped to purchase necessary perishable supplies, as well as expand educational opportunities. Due to the success of the organization, it is being used as a model for other youth outreach programs in other communities.

May All Be Fed Food Shelf

May All Be Fed Food Shelf has been in existence at Grace for over 20 years and continues to be an emergency source of non-perishable food items for families who are struggling to put food on the table.

Outreach Ministries—Continued

May All Be Fed Food Pantry is stocked entirely by donations from our Grace family. A team of dedicated volunteers, led by Cheryl Nelson, maintain the food shelf on a monthly basis by re-stocking the shelves and removing any outdated items, as well as packing 4 bags of nutritious food items that are then given to each family who requests help with food. This year, we are seeing a significant decline in the number of families requesting to use our food shelf.

Our Savior's Shelter

On the first Monday of every month, servants from Grace put their faith into action by preparing and serving a meal at this homeless shelter in Minneapolis. Families and small groups enjoy doing this ministry together.



Prayer Shawl Ministry

The Prayer Shawl Ministry donated approximately, 27 Prayer Shawls last year to Mercy Hospitals Chaplian. We have seven made since the first of this year and will also be donating them to Mercy Hospital.

Stepping Stone

Stepping Stone is emergency housing Shelter in Anoka for the homeless who are single and 18 years and older. Stepping Stone has the capacity to house 66 residents, but always have many, many people on their waiting list. They also provide mentoring and life skills training for their residents as they strive towards self-sufficiency.

A team of 5 Grace volunteers rotate to provide food pickup



and delivery to Stepping Stone every Friday afternoon from two Caribous and Andover Pizza Ranch. Grace also has two additional individual volunteers who do a Thursday Anoka-Hennepin school food pickup and delivery during the school year. For Christmas, the Grace congregation generously provided 93 Target "Gifts of Grace" bags filled with appropriate male or female personal toiletries of razors, soaps, shampoos, deodorant, and Christmas treats of hats, gloves, candy etc. The extra bags get saved and given to new residents as they come into Stepping Stone housing.
