

Incline your ear and come to me, listen so that you may live! Isaiah 55:3

I have been working on listening to God. This is probably not something that is comforting coming from your new pastor, but it's true. It takes work to listen to God. Listening to God is hard. So often in my life, I have plenty of things to *say* to God. "God could you help me with this." "God could you guide me with that." "God let me know the plans that you have for me." I have become very confident in God's skills as a great listener. But my ability to listen to God is something that I must work at. I know that I'm not alone in this, even as a spiritual leader. Our world is busy. Our lives are noisy. Silence is something that can feel uncomfortable and sometimes even unsafe. Often in the silence our insecurities creep in or our "to do" lists overtake our brains. But over the past few months I have been making a conscience effort to just sit in silence. I often begin with a prayer: "God I am listening. Help me to hear you and what you want for me to do." I will admit that often what I hear is silence. I have on occasion been successful in clearing my mind and not having it immediately filled with all sorts of distracting thoughts, but even when that happens, I haven't walked away with a clear sense of what God was saying to me. It is hard listening to God. But often it is the hard things that are the most important things for us to do.

We have a lot of important decisions on the horizon for Grace Lutheran: decisions about where God is leading us, decisions about what our new vision is, decisions about our properties and building projects. I am convinced we cannot go forward in any of this unless we are spending time listening to God. Because while, I am called to be



So I am hoping that you will join me in listening to God. As a staff we are listening to God by praying our way through the first chapter of the Gospel of Mark, the Gospel that we will be reading and studying this upcoming year. I hope that you will join us in this venture. Read a small section of Mark. Start at Jesus' baptism and read only that section and wonder. What is God saying to Jesus? What is God doing?

your new pastor, the truth is I am not the one who is leading Grace, God is. God is the one who is guiding our church and all of us. When we lay aside our own agendas and listen to God, I truly believe that God will speak. God will lead us in the right direction so that we might know what we are called to do as God's people today. What is God saying to me? What words or phrases captures your attention? What questions do you have? Sit in silence for five minutes listening to God. After Jesus' baptism move onto the next session and do the same thing until you have worked slowly through the entire first chapter. Please don't rush it. Take it slow and listen.

A few weeks ago, I spent a busy day at work constantly talking to people on staff and other members of Grace Lutheran. As I was thinking and dreaming about our future, I kept wondering about the past. "What are the stories of Grace Lutheran that I need to know?" I pondered. "How do we share these stories?" Later that evening as I was walking my dog and praying- a voice entered my head and my heart telling me "Look forward." It might have been the wind, or just the movement of my body, but the longer I walked the more clearly the voice was "Look forward." I realized in that moment that God was telling me something, while I do believe the stories of Grace's past are important and have shaped this church, I believe it is time for Grace to look forward and to move ahead. You all have done important and meaningful work by being a part of Grace. I am so thankful for the ways your previous pastors have nourished your faith and helped you grow closer to God. Grace has a strong foundation to stand on. A foundation that begins with God's love for you and for the world and has been sculpted and molded by your faithfulness and your willingness to follow. And now God is leading us forward to a new future and a new vision for tomorrow.

Mark's Gospel begins with these words: "The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God." We are at the beginning of a new year, the beginning of our time together, the beginning of a new vision for Grace Lutheran. I hope that you will join me in this time of listening to God, because I know God is still talking and in inclining our ear to God that we will have life. I know God has amazing plans for us as we look forward together. *Pastor Joanna Mitchell*

Recap of the Cottage Meetings

"Getting to Know You Gatherings"

with Pastor Joanna What you said about Grace Lutheran Church

In the fall of 2019, I met with 112 people from Grace Lutheran Church in small group gatherings mostly in people's homes. I heard many stories of faith and also stories about what brought people to Grace and how Grace became your faith-home. I am grateful for this opportunity. I also spent time listening to your thoughts on Grace. Each person had the opportunity to answer the questions:

What is one strength of Grace?

What is one growth area for Grace?

What is one community need for Andover and the surrounding area?

What is one thing you are passionate about (hobby or interest)?

All of our Vision Board members attended at least one of these cottage meetings. I reviewed the responses, counted them, and grouped them into categories. The top responses and categories from the first three questions and a summary of the responses are listed below. Percentages are based on the number of responses in each category. This winter, the Vision Board and Staff of Grace will review these responses to help us plan our future ministry together.



AREAS OF <u>STRENGTH:</u> (128 responses) <u>WELCOMING/FRIENDLY</u> (32%)

The spirit of welcome that is a part of Grace Lutheran is one of our greatest strengths. I heard that Grace is a welcoming/friendly church repeatedly at every single one of the small group gatherings. People feel well welcomed and felt like they were seen when they walked through the doors of Grace. This has allowed for Grace to feel like coming home to many people and because of this it has become their Spiritual home.

MISSION/OUTREACH (22%):

Grace's ministry extends beyond its doors and into the community. You are a church that puts your faith into action. Grace cares deeply about our neighbors and believes that part of living your faith is responding to the needs of people around us. People are thankful for our participation in Family Promise, Sand Creek Elementary, Haiti and Rakai. We have both a local and international focus in caring for others.

PEOPLE/CONNECTIONS (19%):

YOU are the greatest strength of Grace Lutheran. Along with being welcoming and friendly, being a caring community is at the heart of Grace Lutheran. You show up for each other. Grace as a family of faith knows how to care for one another during times of grief and difficulty. Your connections have helped you grow spiritually in small groups and you have developed meaningful relationships. WOW was listed as an important source of connection and "Sundays at Grace" were listed too.

INCLUSIVITY (6%)

People are thankful that Grace Lutheran welcomes everyone regardless of your family situation, your sexual orientation/identity, and background. When we say, "all are welcome," we mean it. Some people wonder how we might make this inclusive welcome more known to people outside our walls. Is it time to raise a rainbow flag or to indicate our open welcome in some other way?

OTHER (under 5%)

People are thankful for the work of our staff and their care for them. Our worship services were praised for their music and also for their grace-filled relatable sermons. People feel that our location on Round Lake Blvd. and Bunker is an advantage for us because we are so visible to people driving by. Finally, our dedication to youth and children's ministry is a strength that we have at Grace.



AREAS TO GROW (86 responses):

CHILDREN'S MINISTRY (22%)

All of the transitions in our children's ministry programming over the past few years has been difficult for Grace. Children are an important aspect of our ministry and people want to continue to invest in our children so that we can continue to nurture and grow our young people. Our lack of VBS last year was a lament shared by a number of people. VBS has been such a strong program that involved many people and our church desires for this to continue to be true. Suggested ways to invest in our children's ministry: consistency of staff (if possible), work to establish a closer connection with our daycare, involve kids in worship, intergenerational activities.



Recap of the Cottage Meetings

PEOPLE/CONNECTIONS: (20%)

While connecting with one another is seen as a strength, it is also a growth area for Grace Lutheran. Some of our newer members are wondering how they might become more connected. Many people said they feel well welcomed initially but then struggle to find the next step. Some of our outreach programs have felt closed to them. People desire more follow-up when they sign up for an event or a volunteer opportunity. On the flip-sidepeople who are leading these program struggle to find people to volunteer. They feel tired and want more people to join their groups. People also want more adult education and small groups (couples' groups, singles groups and intergenerational and family ministry along with ways to grow spiritually and support groups.)

YOUTH MINISTRY (11%)

People want ways for our youth to be more active in the everyday life of the congregation: in worship (music, serving communion, reading) and in service (how are youth a part of our outreach?). This has been such a vital part of Grace's ministry; recent numbers have fallen in enrollment and so there is some concern among members (however we still have 90 youth in catechism). There is a desire for there to be ministry for young adults and to make sure we don't lose kids after confirmation.

BUILDING 10%

Our building, at times, gets in the way of our activities. Our narthex is not large enough to provide a space for fellowship after worship. We also have the portables that provide classroom space, but they need to be removed soon. What will we do instead? Our building has been added onto many times and so we have multiple heating systems that prove to be difficult. There is also the question of the land on Nightingale. What is the best location for our future ministry? Round Lake Blvd or Nightingale? What will we gain or lose in either location?

WORSHIP (7%)

People are grateful for the variety of worship that is offered but some would like there to be more distinction. Some desire a livelier contemporary service that might engage seekers with occasional dramas. Others want to embrace more of the traditional elements of worship like a regular confession/ forgiveness and using the Apostle's creed more often. Sound is also a concern and one person suggested that we mic the choir.

NEEDS IN THE COMMUNITY (65 responses):

CONNECTIONS (32%)

The greatest need identified by our participants was a way for people to connect with each other in our community. People are concerned about loneliness and isolation for people of all



ages (our youth (15%) and our seniors (5%) were repeatedly named). We also wondered about how to connect with people who are "unchurched."

HOMELESSNESS/HUNGER (27%)

Homelessness and hunger are a major concern for our community. We want to make sure people have their basic needs provided for. Our engagement in Family Promise continues to open our eyes to the needs of people who need stable housing. Other concerns for housing were affordable housing and senior housing.

MENTAL HEALTH (11%)

Anxiety, depression and other mental health concerns rose to the top of our concerns for our community. You want to make sure that there is adequate support for people with mental health concerns and have a particular concern for our youth's mental health.

DIVERSITY (7.5%)

Diversity was raised in two different ways. One was the lack of diversity that is present in Andover. The second way was a wonder about how to reach out to people of different diversities and how we as a faith community might be more inclusive.

OTHER:

Some other needs there were named were a lack of mass transit (2 people), employment opportunities (3 people), spirituality of our community (3 people), affordable daycare (1 person) and drugs (1).

Thank you for taking the time to read the results of my cottage meetings. I believe that this information is useful in our discernment about who we are at Grace Lutheran and where God is calling us to go in Jesus' name. I hope that you will join me in praying and listening to God as we envision our future together.

LENT 2020: Following Jesus into the arena

Brené Brown begins her book *Daring Greatly* with a quote from Theodore Roosevelt, often referred to as the "Man in the Arena." It is from his speech at the Sorbonne in Paris, France in April 1910.

It is not the critic who counts; not the man who points out how the strong man stumbles, or where the doer of deeds could have done better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs, who comes short again and again, because there is no effort without error and shortcoming; but who does actually strive to do the deeds; who knows great enthusiasms, the great devotions; who spends himself in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement, and who at the worsts, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly...

Every time I hear this quote and imagine the man stumbling in the arena, his face in the dirt, I imagine the face of Jesus. Those critics standing on the sidelines with all their judgment and all their questions and disapproval seem familiar. I've encountered them in my own life, haven't you? But what gives me courage in my day to day life, is knowing that I am not alone in having encountered the critic and the judge, but Jesus has faced it too. In fact, Jesus faced it day after day in his ministry and every time he did- he showed us what it is like to face vulnerability. He showed us what it was like to live a life of courage, and to dare to step in the arena because this is where authenticity happens, this is where truthfulness, beauty and love can grow.

If you haven't heard of Brené Brown, I hope that you will watch her TED Talks: *The Power of Vulnerability* and *Listening to Shame* (yes plural- one on shame, one on vulnerability (both are great!)). I know that one of our WOW groups is currently studying her book, "The Gift of Imperfection." Often times we think of vulnerability as being a weakness. We don't like feeling vulnerable because when we do we feel exposed and yet, Brown argues that vulnerability is not weakness at all. Vulnerability is courage, in fact it is daring to show up and be seen.

When I think about the Gospels and the ministry of Jesus, one of the most consistent things I notice is that Jesus sees people. He really sees them. Often there is a critic in the background busy judging the person, busy hiding his own truth, but Jesus always moves beyond that. Jesus walks towards people. He walks toward vulnerability and he shows up in the lives of people and allows them to know that they are not alone. Brown states in her research that the biggest weapon against shame is empathy. When those things in our life that we have been conditioned to be ashamed of erupt we often want to hide them and then shame grows. But if we



expose our shame to the light, to empathy it dissipates, the power is gone. When Jesus walked along and encountered people, he not only saw them, but he looked at them with eyes of compassion, with empathy. He took away

their shame and in place of words of judgment, he empowered them with words of love and belonging. I believe in our lives as Christians this is what we are called to do—to walk alongside Jesus having the courage to be vulnerable, having the courage to be seen and to see others; having the courage to receive empathy and be empathetic in our care for the world so that we and all people might live whole-heartedly.

For Lent this year we will be using Brené Brown's research and book Daring Greatly as an outline for our study of the Gospels. We will be encountering the stories of Jesus and examining his courage, his vulnerabilities and the ways in which he empowered people to live whole-heartedly. I hope you will join us in this study. There are two ways you can participate. There will be an opportunity to be a part of a small group from 6pm-7pm that meets together during our Lenten dinners. Please sign up in January and February to be a part of a small group. However, you don't need to be a part of a small group to participate in our Lenten Worship. If you don't want to be a part of a small group, I hope that you will still join us for worship at 7pm where we will explore stories in the Gospels through the lens of Dr. Brown's work.

We live in a culture of scarcity. Where we are often told there isn't enough or we are not enough. But Jesus gives us a different message: as God's children we are enough and so is everyone else. Knowing this, how can we let go of our own feelings of unworthiness, our fears, our anxiety and our desire to numb and instead move to be authentic, thankful, courageous, creative, and have trusting faith.

I hope you will join us on this adventure facing vulnerability and shame together so that we might dare to follow Jesus into the arena and experience more compassionate, courageous and connected lives.

10 Years Serving Family Promise

Thank you to everyone who helped serve our Family Promise guests over the Thanksgiving Holiday. Homelessness is an extremely trying time for families and especially poignant over a holiday. The families we served were all very grateful for our hospitality.

Family Promise is actually a nationally recognized program and the nation's leading nonprofit fighting family homelessness. Karen Olson, the founder of Family Promise, was inspired to do something after discovering that homelessness was affecting families right in her own community of Union County, New Jersey. Karen had an idea to bring together people in need and people who wanted to help. Existing community resources could provide shelter, meals, and housing. Volunteers could use their skills, knowledge, and compassion to help their homeless neighbors find employment, reconnect with society, and restore their dignity. The first Interfaith Hospitality Network was opened on October 27th, 1986. When other communities in New Jersey heard what was happening in Union County, they began to develop their own networks. In 1988, the National Interfaith Hospitality Network was formed with a goal of bringing the program nationwide.

Now, over 30 years later, Family Promise has over 200 affiliates operating in 43 states across the US. Each year the national office hosts a Conference for affiliates and shares the latest ideas, research, practices, and new programs. In 2018 they introduced a cleaner, more modern logo, in line with a two-year brand refresh. 

Mental Health Awareness

Last spring the SALT Team (Grace Lutheran Church's Adult Education and Prayer Ministry) began discussing the issue of mental health and what our church could do to assist in this arena. I think all of us know someone who deals with anxiety, depression, eating disorders, PTSD or other mental health conditions. As part of my own journey and learning, I recently read several books about mental health and the role of the church. Historically, the church in general has not done a great job understanding and accepting the complex medical diagnoses that cause mental illness. Despite the broader church's missteps, people facing mental health challenges (and those who live with, love and care for them) often seek help from the church and specifically their pastor.

During my junior year of high school, I took a psychology class. During that class we began to hear stories of people's experiences with mental health. We heard the ins and outs of their daily life, their experiences and changes in their mental state, and their encounters with the world and how it perceived them. Afterwards we were given the opportunity to have conversations about what we heard. During one of our conversations I saw something that changed my perspective on the topic of mental health for years to come. The boy next to me began to tear up, he took a moment to compose himself and he said, "It's nice to know that the conversation, although it's hard, is something we are willing to have." I didn't understand why he said these words and why it took so much out of him. He later explained in private that he had been diagnosed with mild schizophrenia and that most people only saw one piece of him. He said that he could see in his everyday life the way that people felt about those who had experienced the same mental health diagnoses as him and he knew that they saw him as "not like them." He said that he took the class as a way to better understand himself

but never knew that people would want to learn and even talk about the challenges that he faced. I think about this conversation when I open a psychology book or have a conversation about mental health in our world today. It reminds me that all it takes is a moment to listen. One of the greatest obstacles facing the topic of mental health is the stigma. Many people are uncomfortable talking about the mental health challenges they or a loved one have encountered. In addition, even close friends and family members often don't know what to say or sometimes say the wrong things. When we as the church begin with the simple act of reaching out and being open to hearing each



other's stories and entering the conversation on mental health we are helping stop the stigma. Our willingness to listen to one another may allow those who currently feel voiceless to feel heard. When we seek to understand our brothers and sisters - <u>while</u> they are experiencing both their joys and sorrows - then we can see people the way Jesus does.

To help us grow in our understanding of and compassion towards those facing mental health issues, we have formed a mental health team and have begun planning a series of events at Grace for 2020. In early February we will be having a worship service focused on mental health and a presentation from NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness) on February 23rd. We hope you will join us for these events and join the conversation because we want to hear your voice so that we can learn and grow together.
