Waiting for God in the flesh!

If there ever has been a year for waiting it is 2020. We have waited for COVID-19 to pass. We have waited for restaurants and stores to open. We have waited to get back to work. We have waited for the seasons to change. We have waited for normal to return and still we wait. In the last few weeks, our family has moved back into isolation. Even though for the most part, we haven't been overly social since March, we were more social this summer than we are now. My kids aren't seeing their friends. We aren't seeing any relatives. For the most part it is just us. I am grateful for my family, and I know that some people are waiting alone, and how hard that must be. I continue to pray for you! In the meantime, we are finding ways to connect with people virtually and

allowing the computer to once again be the way we find nourishment and community.

John 1:14 states: The word became flesh and blood and moved into the neighborhood (The Message version). The first chapter is the Christmas story in John. There is no birth story here, but instead a new beginning

for humanity in which the Word (aka God) comes into the world with skin on. Skin that can be touched and caressed. Flesh that can reach out with a hug. Blood that can make you blush and bleed.


It has been a fleshy year. One in which our physical bodies have mattered deeply. We have recognized the vulnerability of our flesh in the face of a pandemic. We have been asked to pay attention to how close we get to others, to what we touch, and who we even breathe on. While we have focused on the physical body, we have also realized the strain that **not** being in contact with other people can have on our overall health. We know that we and our loved ones need more than phone calls and kind words, but hugs and hands to hold. I long for the day when I can greet someone with a handshake and a smile again, and when I don't have to think twice about hugging my parents or a friend. But for now; we wait. We wait with longing for that day to come again.

Advent comes every year. A time of waiting. A time of anticipation. A time when we know that God is about to do something new. God is going to be born into our world to transform it. God knows our need for flesh and blood connection. God recognized it and God was born as a vulnerable baby, who had to be cuddled close. A baby with a new baby smell who needed to be tended and nurtured. A baby who knew what it was like to be loved and held, and who would one day do the same for other people. To love them and hold them in his own arms.

I grieve for the Christmases of our past, when I took for granted the number of people we could pack into the sanctuary and the variety of activities that stressed us out over the month of December. And yet, I won-

People of Grace,

Have you ever received a notification like this: "Your startup disk is almost full. To make more space available on your startup disk, delete some files." Or "You are running out of disk space... Click here to see if you can free space on this drive." During seasons of virtual church, I get this notification a lot. All the videos I am making and editing take up so much space on my computer. The great thing about it is that it ensures I clean up and get rid of the things I am no longer using.

We all are approaching the holiday season a little differently because of the pandemic. Going virtual means approaching ministry and life differently. My proverbial "startup disk" is almost full. And as I have reached out to different families, individuals, teachers, medical professionals, retired and homebound folks, I am hearing that you too are experiencing a "running out of space" notification. Enter the church's built-in clean up software: the Season of Advent. A season of waiting. Something our culture is not too good at. We are driven by phrases like, "Get going," "do something," "you can make a difference," or my personal favorite from childhood, "boring people are bored." All these statements emphasize if we aren't doing anything we aren't contributing; we aren't growing. But really, we aren't tired of waiting. We are tired of wishing. And maybe afraid what we are wishing for won't happen. We are afraid to face ourselves; we are afraid of others, and afraid of the future. We are wishing for that promotion or new job; we are wishing for an end to COVID-19; we are wishing for the church, school, restaurant, and work doors to open. So how do we wait? How do we clean up space on our hard drives?

Our Advent stories are full of people whose startup disks are full. Elizabeth lives her whole life barren. Her life would not have been easy. The whispers behind her back about why she was barren. I am sure she had wished her whole life for a child. And it is in her story that we are told about her husband Zechariah, who because he doesn't believe, loses his ability to speak. What a way to force you to be present in the waiting? In a way, through this act, God is saying: "Zechariah, I really want you to pay attention to every moment, because I promise I am doing something. It may seem impossible, but trust me."

In the same way, an unwed, pregnant teenager, Mary's startup disk is running out of space as she waits for a promised, impossible, unexpected hope. It isn't until an angel appears to her fiancé, that he believes her. And she must flee her home to live with her aunt, probably because of the cruelty of those who do not understand and do not want to believe the impossible, and unexpected IS happening! We know the outcome, but these women didn't. I imagine their disks were full; they were worried and afraid. I imagine they didn't know just what they were waiting for or how exactly it would happen. And yet Mary says, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word." People who are waiting, know something IS happening, they trust God, and they want to be present for it. I invite you into this Advent practice: something IS happening, trust God and be present. We might not know the outcome or how exactly we are going to get there, and it won't be pain free, but it wasn't for Elizabeth, Zechariah, or Mary either. And yet they trusted, they knew something was happening and they wanted to experience it. And in staying present, they helped usher in the Savior of the World. Might we do the same this year?

der if there is something magical that can happen in the waiting. If just like an expectant mother, we might find joy in what is growing inside of us as we wait. If we perhaps can have heightened awareness to our senses: the smells, sounds and sights of the season. Birthing something requires pain. It requires us being willing to be uncomfortable at times, to share space and to give up some of ourselves. I had terrible pregnancies. I was so sick the entire time, but looking back on the birth of my children, I know that on the day they were born, something in me was born too. I became a mother. I had grown and changed in their births. In Christ's birth we are invited to grow too, to be transformed by God who is living and breathing and surrounding us with God's love. The process will be uncomfortable at times. You might long for the waiting to be over, but in the end something new will be born in you. I

pray that as you wait this Advent, that you do so marveling in this amazing promise of God in the flesh, and that you open yourself up to what God is birthing in you today.


