Hopeful Expectations! For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope, for who hopes for what is seen? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience. Romans 8:24-25

This is one of my favorite verses in scripture because I find it to be so true. When people in my churches have endured terrible obstacles, this is the verse that will come into my head during my prayers. I hear God whispering to me, "You just can't see it yet, but you can have hope. Remember, we hope for what we do not see!" I need this reminder, because often I want to wrap hope up in a basket and hand it out to people who are suffering. Don't you wish we could just buy hope and share it? Of course, this isn't how hope works. It is unseen; something longed for; something we turn to God for; something that only comes with time.

When we envisioned 2020, this is NOT what we envisioned for our church. We had different expectations about what our faith community and our world would look like. I know that I am not alone in feeling grief about all that has transpired this year. And yet, I have hope in what is ahead because I trust that God is leading us. Our theme for our Stewardship Appeal is *Hopeful Expectations*! As a stewardship team and vision board, as we prayed and reflected about the future of Grace and where God is leading us in 2021, we needed to tell the truth about the present reality. There is suffering. There is groaning, and we live as people of hope.

Everything I know about faith tells me that when things get hard and we start to give up, this is when God shows up. When Abraham and Sarah lost hope in the promised child, God showed up and Isaac was born. When Jesus went to the cross and died, God showed up. God is showing up for us too.

God has heard our groaning and the cries of our community and God is leading us to respond. As we look to 2021, God is calling us to strengthen and grow the ministry here at Grace Lutheran Church. One of our initiatives is to provide for the basic needs of our church and the greater community. We plan to do this by eliminating registration costs for Sunday School and Catechism and by expanding our ability to respond to people in need by providing emergency resources through our food shelf and other local partnerships.

As difficult as this year has been, I am so grateful for you. Your generosity has allowed our ministry to continue and thrive during a year where we have been physically distanced from each other. Every time there is a need in the community, and we have asked for help, you show up to give of your time and your finan-

Temporary Portable Classrooms Do Not Last Forever!

Covid-19, never ending elections, civil unrest... None of these overwhelming issues will derail this congregation from moving ahead in our next big decision/mission. The current permit for our portables expires late 2023 which will require the temporary portables that have served us so well to be removed. The city of Andover has made it clear that they will not renew our permit for the portables. The big decision is to determine what direction the church should take to deal with this situation.

Looking forward with faith, a committee has been formed to lead us on a journey that will be inclusive and transparent. Pastor Joanna, Frances Fernandez, Dennis Grabowski, Jackie Glockner, Greg Ackerson, Neil Hawkinson, Sandy Schmoll, and Charlie Wold have agreed to serve on the committee. Our committee welcomes any and all input from the congregation.

The options before us include:

- Stay at our present location without adding space to replace space lost from the removal of the portables. This choice mandates adding ADA compliant restrooms to replace those lost in the portables. We must also perform maintenance to roofs and our parking lot plus other needed improvements.
- Add floorspace to our current location and include the items mentioned in number 1 above.
- Build a new church on the Nightingale property. (Located just off Crosstown Boulevard 3.5 miles north of Grace)

Each of these options poses financial questions?? Do we sell the Nightingale property to fund options 1) or 2)? Do we sell the current church to help fund a new church? Can we raise sufficient funds to do option 1) without selling Nightingale?

The committee is now investigating property values of each of the two sites, incorporating staff inputs regarding needs, identifying architects and or design/build contractors that can help move the process along, building code changes, and assessing general trends in growth within our larger community.

Before we get too far along, we will request input from our congregation as to what you believe we will need for the next 10 years. Are we looking for larger gathering spaces or more convertible classroom space or do we need any more space, simply better utilization? Anticipate polling and gatherings, either in person or virtual, in the next few months as we continue this journey God has placed before us.

As we assemble the pieces identified above, budgets will be assigned to the various options allowing decisions and directions to be determined. Throughout this journey, our objective is to be inclusive, transparent, and honest. With God's help, we will together generate the best path for our congregation.

NOVEMBER NOISY OFFERINGS Grace 4 Rakai and Feed My Starving Children By Debbie Jorgens

Grace 4 Rakai: Malaria is a leading cause of death in Uganda, and because the Ugandan government has been primarily focused on containing COVID-19 since earlier this year, malaria medication is in dangerously limited supply. Ugandans across the country are at risk - including the vulnerable women and children in Rakai. But we can help! For the first two weeks in November, Noisy Offerings will be directed to Grace 4 Rakai to be used toward the purchase and distribution of malaria medication that can literally mean the difference between life and death.

FMSC: Noisy Offerings for the 2nd half of November will benefit Feed My Starving Children (FMSC). Hunger causes nearly half of deaths in children under age 5 around the world, and tragically, an estimated 6,200 die each day from causes related to undernutrition. As a Christian nonprofit, Feed My Starving Children is dedicated to seeing every child whole in body and spirit, and to that end, the organization works with food distribution partners within communities to effect lasting change. People of Grace,

The Minneapolis Area Synod, of which Grace is a part, has asked all of its congregations to think about racial justice in their contexts. They have invited us to create a racial justice statement that explores and describes our commitment to the work of racial justice in our own communities.

Here, at Grace, we have already begun this work, some of us individually, and some together through our weekly or now monthly Conversations on Race. As a team, SALT (Seek, Abide, Love, Trust: Grace's Adult Education and Prayer Ministry Team), has also begun thinking about racial justice in our community and beyond. Below you will find the ELCA Churchwide Racial Justice Ministries statement. SALT is excited to start exploring this statement through conversations with all members at Grace. In light of the gospel of Jesus Christ and recent events in our state and nation, we feel anti-racism work is holy and necessary.

Might Grace adopt this statement or one like it? Please join us in reading, studying, and discerning where God calls us to be neighbors to people whose experiences are different than our own.

Our plan each week is to release different reflections, some written and some video recordings of our own discernment with the ELCA statement below. In good "Lutheran" fashion we will follow the example Martin Luther laid out in his small catechism. After each petition we will ask: What does this mean? How do we see these words already in action at Grace? Where could Grace step up and meet God's call for justice and mercy? As you listen and read along, we hope you too will join the conversation!

Here are some of the responses we have received from the first round of Adult Small Groups:

"...thank you for being brave and bold and leading a group and learning alongside of the group. I think this act alone is a role model of what churches need to increase involvement. If we wait until we are experts or perfect to lead, the church would not have small groups... During this time of COVID and its challenges, I have been seeking easy paths, and this class is not it. However, I also believe the Lord provides what you need, not necessarily what you want. So, I am doubling down and selfreflecting and really inhaling the messages this book [*Non-Violent Communication*] provides. And, I am keeping that deep breath inside before I exhale and rush into action. And, this isolating time of COVID is an opportunity to slow down to do that." - "Non-Violent Communication Study" participant

"The book has been extremely powerful for me. The discussion has been engaging and I feel that everyone has been able to share/chime in at some point throughout the study so far." -"Non-Violent Communication Study" participant

"Although we have a small group for memoir writing, we are having expansive discussions about those life moments that draw us together. We have discovered so many experiences that we have in common. Sharing stories allows us to explore our feelings, and to realize the impact that others have had on shaping the people we have become. Memoirs, as opposed to autobiographies, are more narrowly focused and relate single moments in our lives. Only when we zero in on certain incidents or certain relationships that we've encountered do we get a better sense of who we are. After all, we all have a story to tell; that's why it's called *his*tory or *hers*tory. Come explore your own story." -Jan Anderson, "Life Moments Through Memoir" Leader.

"Our Sunday evening contemporary worship music in the parking lot is being cut short by this sudden change in the weather. While the weather cooperated, we had a great time and had good attendance." -Greg Ackerson, "Worship Music in the Parking Lot" Leader.

"We are doing a "Mental Health Moment" each week at the start of our meeting. The objective is to actually practice strategies that help improve our mental health. During this time, group members mentally set aside the activities and busy-ness of their days and become more relaxed and present. We have had multiple people lead these exercises which typically focus on paying attention to our breathing. Some of the leading mental health organizations in the US are incorporating similar mindfulness exercises into their meetings, and we thought this was a great "practice" for us to do." -Nancy Jenkins, "Mental Illness and the Church" Co-Leader.
