Happy New Year!

2021 here we come! I have learned a lot in 2020. Things I never wanted to know, like about how a virus spreads, how to better ventilate buildings and how long you need to quarantine. But I have also learned some insightful pieces too. I have learned the value of community and my need for connection. I have learned that signs of hope in a window, or chalked in a driveway can brighten my day (at least for a moment), and that God's Spirit can still be present in prayers over the phone and in Zoom bible studies. I don't know what 2021 will look like, and perhaps that is the biggest learning for me in 2020; life is more unpredictable than I imagined, and yet God is faithful.

There is a lot on the horizon for our church. We have some big decisions to make when it comes to our two properties (see the article by Dennis Grabowski and Charlie Wold). Once that decision is made, we need to figure out what the needs are for our physical building and how they reflect our val-

ues. Hopefully, in this new year we will start to be able to gather in-person more and more and reignite some of our small groups that have been on hold, while continuing to use the virtual space for prayer, connection, spiritual growth, and care. There are possibilities on the horizon that I am excited for, I hope you are too.

Beginning right after Christmas we will be reading through the Gospel of Luke in worship. I hope that you will pick up your bible and start at the beginning and read the entire book of Luke between now and Easter. Trust me, it won't be that hard. Luke is the gospel where many of the familiar parables are told: the lost coin, the lost sheep, the lost son and also where we hear the story of the good Samaritan. In that parable, Jesus invites us to consider who is our neighbor, and reminds us that our neighbor is often not who we expect, and acting neighborly is one of the most important aspects of our faith.

In order to understand what Jesus means when it comes to loving our neighbor, which I think is an ongoing life goal, it means that we listen to our neighbor and come to understand their thoughts and experience, not assuming it is the same as our own. In order to do this, I am inviting everyone at Grace to read the book *Waking up White* by Debby Irving in January . Did you know that the Lutheran Church is the whitest denomination in the United States? It is! One of our Vision Board members told the story of going to church in downtown Charleston, South Carolina, expecting it to be much more racially diverse than our own church, only to discover that even there, the Lutheran church was primarily composed of white people.

I read the book *Waking Up White* a few years ago and discovered a lot about my own identity. It made me aware of some of the assumptions I have always held and discover my own culture of whiteness, something I had not spent much time thinking about. Knowing who we are is important especially if we want to be a good neighbor to others. The former Bishop of Southeast Minnesota Synod of the ELCA, Steven Delzer says this: "Reading *Waking up White* was a real eye opener, that helped me become aware of the system that has privileged me for my whole life (white privilege), while this same system has been the source of oppression for people of color, thus perpetuating a system that favors one race over another." I hope that you will join our class on Monday nights and if you don't have time for that, please still read the book and find a partner or small group of your own to discuss it with.

Finally, one of the things we will be discussing in this new year are the values of Grace. Before the pandemic hit in March, I had been meeting with small groups and listening to stories about Grace. Through these stories I was compiling notes about the values that our congregation holds. According to author and church consultant, Susan Beaumont, "Core values are not descriptions of our mission, the work we do, or the strategies we employ. They are principles that we hold and beliefs that we share." Together with a small group of people, I have taken the stories that have been shared and compiled a proposed list of core values for Grace. The Vision Board has also spent time reflecting on them as well. This list is a rough draft that I want to share with you.

As we approach the end of this year, we at Grace are excited to welcome a new database system - *Realm*. Realm is replacing our Access ACS platform for a cloud-based system that can be accessed anywhere! *GraceLink* will now be called

GraceRealm, a system that will allow you to communicate with church leaders as well as members of the congregation. You will be able to sign up for events and groups in an easier fashion, pledge, give, etc. If you had a login to GraceLink you should have received a Realm e-mail to reset your password. If you did not have a GraceLink account, you should have received an invite from Realm to create one. Didn't get the e-mail? No worries! Just call us and we'll be happy to send it out so you can connect to the *GraceRealm* community. Feel free to explore the system and don't forget to download the app for your smart phone! The new app is called RealmConnect and it will replace the previous ChurchLife app. You can upload your photo to update our directory, edit your information, etc. We are looking forward to learning alongside you in building our Community through Realm, and appreciate your patience as we update our website. If you have any questions about the system or need assistance logging in, just give us a call at 763-421-6520.

The Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act, enacted last spring, includes several temporary tax changes helping charities, including the special \$300 deduction designed especially for people who choose to take the standard deduction, rather than itemizing their deductions. Under this new change, individual taxpayers can claim an "above-the-line" deduction of up to \$300 for cash donations made to charity during 2020. This means the deduction lowers both adjusted gross income and taxable income – translating into tax savings for those making donations to qualifying tax-exempt organizations. Grace has recently expressed the true body of Christ in their generosity to others during the holiday season. I think that is the essence of who we are here in Andover, Minnesota. EPIPHANY

People of Grace,

Now that Christmas and New Years have passed, we have entered into the season of the church year called Epiphany (it's festival day marks the seasons beginning on January 6)! I know my church nerd tendencies are showing when I begin talking about the seasons of the church year, and sometimes I just cannot help it.

While on a walk with a friend we were discussing Mary's encounter with the Holy Spirit in the annunciation narrative and we compared it to Simeon's experience of the Holy Spirit in the next week's text when Jesus and his family go to the temple. Mary was overshadowed by the Holy Spirit, Simeon was guided by the Spirit. We thought how neat is that? Moving from a shadowy darkness, a time of trusting, but not knowing, "how can this be?" to a light filled revealing where Simeon exclaims, "Master, you are now dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel."

Epiphany is the season of this kind of revealing. Revealing who Jesus is and what Jesus came to do. This year we will primarily be reading from the Gospel of Luke and the Acts of the Apostles. Both said to be written by the same author. And each illuminates certain themes: The work of the Holy Spirit, Salvation, and an upsetting of the establishment and spreading the good news and reaching out to those on the margins of society to create a community that reflects the magnitude and inclusivity of the kingdom of God. Those last themes reveal to us our call as Christians today! Throughout the year we will not only look at who Jesus is, but who we are; what is our identity in Christ. The books of Luke and Acts will illuminate our way.

And don't get me wrong, now that this has been revealed to us, doesn't mean that we will always get it right. Epiphany, this year, for me is an invitation to enter into a journey or a conversation with God and with the world around me. This invitation is for us to grow and learn together. To have conversations like the upcoming book study "Waking Up White" and not knowing the answers or even the questions to ask sometimes, but entering into the conversation together, walking together through life anyway. Hopefully through our work together with the Holy Spirit's guiding, God and God's messages to us will continually be revealed to us!

May the Light of Christ make your darkness bright!

Building/Construction Team Update



Building/ Construction Team Update

Proverbs 15:22

"Plans fail for lack of counsel,
but with many advisers they succeed."

Proverbs 15:22 says it well and defines where the Building/Construction Team finds itself; we need your advice and counsel. The congregation will be asked to make a decision on Jan. 31, 2021, regarding the two properties we have been blessed with: Grace Lutheran Church on Round Lake and Bunker Lake Blvds. and the undeveloped property on Nightingale.

This decision regarding our properties is needed due to the City of Andover mandating the removal of our two portable classrooms no later than spring of 2024. Two congregational meetings have been scheduled to discuss the options before us, regarding these properties. They are scheduled for the Sundays of January 17th and 24th with an anticipated decision/vote from the congregation during our Congregational Meeting, January 31st. The Building/Construction Team continues to gather information and will share that information with participants at those meetings.

Preliminary financial estimates for the available options are:

- Keep both Properties and develop Nightingale -\$4.5 to \$5.0 Million (based upon \$200/sq ft).
- Sell Grace Church and develop Nightingale \$4.5 to \$5.0 less \$2.0 million from sale = \$2.5 to \$3.0 million.
- Sell Nightingale for about \$800,000 and replace portable space plus repairs and improvements to Grace Church - \$1.0 million less \$800K = about \$200K.

Valuation notes:

 Grace Church Property – Zoned commercial, only suitable use would be church or school, other use would require demolition, land value alone is worth less than \$2 million, current economic

- conditions make it difficult to sell commercial property.
- Nightingale Property Zoned residential, area is growing, empty lot, no demolition required, residential property is currently selling well.

The above efforts are clearly the current priority for the team. Our second priority has been to identify an architectural firm to assist in developing plans once the congregation makes a decision on Jan. 31st. Our efforts to find a professional design partner are moving forward and those we have interviewed appear quite capable of transforming our needs into beautiful spaces. Once a decision is made about where Grace will be, we want to invite the congregation in to share your hopes and dreams and desires for our church building.
