Pastor Delwayne Hahn died on Sunday, January 24th at his home in Cambridge, Minnesota. In his last week, Pastor Hahn was able to be at his beloved home that he had shared with Marilyn and be in the care of his daughters Heidi and Kristiena and granddaughter Dezirae. On his final day, all of his children were able to come and be with him before he finally left this life and joined the Lord.



I was privileged to work alongside Pastor Hahn for the last year and a half. He told me of his diagnosis on the first day we met. And even though I know at times he was weak and weary from his treatments; it was seldom that we on the Grace staff didn't see him in the church office. He loved ministry! Loved it to the very fiber of his being. He loved being a pastor and sharing the good news of God's love with everyone. He believed in the power of the church to transform lives and he did not want that journey to end.

It was on Christmas Eve that he told me he needed to step down from his position at Grace and only one month later he died. For 51 years he served God. This Christmas was the first Christmas Day service that he didn't lead worship, but he was still there on Zoom with the rest of us, hearing again the promise of God proclaimed by the angels, that to us a Savior has been born. This is the gift of our faith, that God comes into it our world. God enters into the darkness, into the grief, into our communities and into our lives. God knows what it is like both to live and to die, and we are assured that nothing can ever separate us from God's love.



If he could have, Pastor Hahn would have served in the church another 20 years, baptizing and preaching and teaching, and we would have been blessed by his wit and his witness. Instead, with both tears in my eyes and joy in my heart, I grieve and celebrate. I grieve that we will no longer serve together, and I won't get to hear his stories any more, or be reminded of the way "they used to do things" in the church. I will miss his care and his support not only for me, but for all of you. I give thanks for the time we shared. For as hard as it is to say goodbye, this is also a day of celebration. I celebrate that he is no longer in pain, or tired

or worn, but can once again do all the things he loves. I celebrate that at long last he gets to be reunited with those he loves, especially his beloved Marilyn. I celebrate that today he is standing before the throne of God having been welcomed to his eternal home. I celebrate the life of Delwayne Hahn and all that he brought into this world. Thanks be to God! Well done, good and faithful servant.

Let us pray:

God of promise, we give you thanks for the life of Delwayne Hahn. For the 51 years that he served your people and shared the gospel. We give you thanks for his witness, his humor, his family, and for all the ways he brought compassion and care into our world. We ask for you to hold us in our grief, to wipe the tears from our eyes, and to remind us again of the eternal promise we have with you. We pray this in Jesus' name. Amen

Funeral plans are still being arranged by his family for the service in New London and he will be buried next to his beloved wife, Marilyn. We, at Grace, did a memorial in our worship on the weekend of Jan. 30/31st. We will be planning a celebration of his life in the spring.

Christian Identity and Values: A Lenten Journey

Peter answered him, "Lord if it is you, command me to come to you on the water. Jesus said, "Come." So, Peter got out of the boat, started walking on the water and came toward Jesus. Matthew 14:28

When I was younger, I never really thought that being a Christian was risky business. The majority of the people I knew were Christian and church always seemed pretty tame. People

were on their best behavior, they dressed nice, they smiled and sat calmly in pews. But the older I get and the more I study the bible, the more I realize that we have subdued the Gospel. Being a Christian is not for the faint of heart. Annie Dillard, says it this way:

On the whole, I do not find Christians, outside of the catacombs, sufficiently sensible of conditions. Does anyone have the foggiest idea what sort of power we so blithely invoke? Or, as I suspect, does no one believe a word of it? The churches are children playing on the floor with their chemistry sets, mixing up a batch of TNT to kill a Sunday morning. It is madness to wear ladies' straw hats and velvet hats to church; we should all be wearing crash helmets. Ushers should issue life preservers and signal flares; they should lash us to our pews. For the sleeping God may wake someday and take offense, or the waking God may draw us out to where we can never return.

I love this image of wearing crash helmets to church and taking seriously the tremendous risk that following Jesus entails. Being a Christian is looking to Jesus and not just staying passively in the boat, but risking getting out on the water with him. It is uncertain, scary at times. There will be waves and invitation to step out of the boat in order to follow Jesus. It is out of the safety and the security of the boat where our wild God will lead us forward to encounter new people, try new things and transform our world. The question that we are invited to contemplate is, what does this really look like for us and for our church? What does it really mean to follow Jesus?

This year for Lent we will be exploring this topic. On Ash Wednesday, we will have a guest preacher from Bethel College who will introduce the topic of Christian Identity and then each week we will be preaching on the 5 values that I presented to you all last month: Centered in Christ, Accepting of Everyone, Compassionate, Connected and Empowered to share God's love. Values, that I believe we hold here at Grace. These values are a rough draft with a working definition. In order for us to accept them as our values, we need to engage them, contemplate if these are the right ones, have dialogue about them, and ask important questions about them. I hope that we will wonder "what does this value mean about my own personal life?", and also "how does this value effect the way we operate as a church?" Our values will help us shape the mission and vision for what is next for Grace Lutheran.

There will be a number of opportunities to participate in Lent. We will be having worship at 1pm, 6pm and 7:15pm in person with a sign-up. We will also be sharing our worship online. We will be forming discussion groups to explore the values each week that will take place in small groups in our sanctuary for our adults, or on zoom and in person for our catechism youth. I hope that you will find a way that feels comfortable for you to participate and be a part of this conversation.



Love and How to Focus your Heart

Last year in my WOW Bible study group I shared this cut out heart and message with each of them and gave them a challenge to direct the love in their hearts off of themselves and onto others for the upcoming "Love Month". Rather than purchasing Valentine gifts for my children, I gave my gift of love and time, but in order to do that I believe we must also have the most important love within us, the love of Jesus. When I grew up, my mother would say at bedtime, "I love you, Dad loves you. And Jesus loves you most of all." It is God who loves us more than we can image. It is God who gives us the desire to love others. And it is God who reminds us that Christ's unfailing love in us is what matters most of all.

We all have love in our hearts, but don't let that love

fail you in these times of stress, anxiety, worry, mourning, and difficult times we are all facing right now. We need to keep our hearts and minds focused on other things. The number one thing we all want now is peace. The pressures of life can do all sorts of things inside us. Fear and anger can fill our minds, and restlessness can disturb our souls. We get to the point where all we want is a little peace, but we can't buy it. Peace comes from God. It is the fruit of his Spirit, along with love, joy, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

Rick Warren highlights the following: Freedom comes when you focus your mind on God's truth. Three things he suggests you can do that will make the biggest difference in managing your mind are:

First, think about Jesus. Hebrews 12:3 says, "Consider him who endured such opposition from sinners, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart." (NIV) What gives you the power to keep on going? You think about Jesus. Keep your mind on who he is and the example he's given you for how to live a life that pleases God.

Second, think about others. Hebrews 10:24 "Let us think of ways to motivate one another to acts of love and good works." (NLT) Many people around the world think about themselves first. So anybody who thinks more about others than they do about themselves is going to shine. When you choose to think about what others may need and how you can help, you'll find that it's hard to let your problems get you down.

Third, think about eternity. The Bible says in Colossians 3:2 "Think about the things of heaven, not the things of earth." (NLT) Whatever you're worried about today is probably not going to matter in five years, much less in eternity. Everything is put into perspective when you think about your life in light of eternity.

We need to focus on Jesus, other people, and your home in eternity. It will take the focus off of yourself, which is

how God intended for you to live. Live in him, and you will bear fruit.

First, I would like to say thank you to all of you who held me in prayer while I was recovering from COVID-19. I am getting better each and every day. I am no longer contagious but can still feel the effects of the virus, mostly in my energy levels. For those of you who sent cards, made meals, or walked my dog Chandler, thank you! It has occurred to me throughout this illness, your prayers and actions over the past few weeks for me is an extension of God's abundant grace! And the best part is that I know all of you do this for each other as well.

At our staff meeting this past week, we created two lists, one that outlined the things we were proud of during the past year and the second, asked about possibilities for sharing God's love in 2021. It has been, and continues to be apparent to all of us on staff at Grace that one of the brightest spots of our lives and ministries is all of you. The ways in which you minister to one another, if it's on Zoom, through a phone call, or a card sent, food delivered, and prayers prayed. For some, this past year has been a year that allowed for more and deeper connections at Grace. Our conversations on Race, Zoom fellowship, mid-week advent worships, and small groups created opportunities to get to know one another in ways that just running to church on Sunday morning and going through the motions doesn't provide. One of my goals with Children's and Family Ministry is how can we continue the conversation of faith past the doors of Grace and into our homes throughout the week. I believe this past year has shown us this possibility and I hope it is a treasure our families continue to discover even as we begin to meet together in person.

I am extremely excited for our journey through the Lenten season this year as together we discover and explore the values at Grace. Historically the Lutheran church in America has not been so good at being "confessional." Although as a tradition, being confes-

sional is at our core, at our foundation. In seminary, it is required reading for all of us to read the Book of Concord. A book that holds our confessional documents, our confessions of our belief and our faith in the Lutheran Church. To confess has multiple meanings. To confess can mean to repent or fall to our knees in apology like Pastor Melissa from Tapestry pointed out in her and Josue's sermon on January 23/24. To confess can also mean to share your belief, we do both of these in worship together in the order of confession and forgiveness, in our singing, in our recitation of the Lord's prayer, scripture, and the creeds, and through the giving and receiving of communion. We most often confess together in worship, but individual confession with a pastor or close friend is faithful and can be very meaningful. Lastly, there is another way we confess our faith. This way might seem like something more charismatic churches do through testimony. How do we share our faith not just with our community of faith, in our homes with our children, but out in the world? As the Associate Pastor of Faith Formation on the list of responsibilities, I was called to Grace to be attentive to, is outreach into the community and create community partnerships. I believe we must work together in ministry to our community. As I said above, this past year has encouraged and empowered us to take our faith deeper, not just going through the motions, and take our faith beyond our church walls and into our homes. Let us not stop there. How could the simple posture of being invitational transform our church once more? What things have we done at Grace this past year that have helped make you feel alive? What would happen if you invited someone in your life to participate next time? or simply shared with friends and family what you have been up to in order to engage their imaginations too? To begin a new conversation? To be confessional about your life and your faith?

At the heart of the Lenten season is the practice of confession. Join me in continuing to explore what this means for us in our life of faith!

Family Promise

The new year is a time for reflection. As an organization, when we look back on this past year we are celebrating all the great things we've accomplished despite everything that challenged us along the way.

In mid-March when we all received the first stay-at-home order, we had a temporary plan to continue to provide shelter for families at our Day Center. As things progressed, and we gained knowledge on the novel Coronavirus, it became clear that our plan was unsustainable and unsafe for the families who wouldn't be able to quarantine while living in community in shared space.

Through the CARES act and a partnership with Anoka County we were able to access funding to shelter families in an extended stay hotel, where they would have private rooms to quarantine if needed and a small kitchenette to prepare meals. Though the main goal of our organization is to provide case management to assist families with identifying and removing barriers to accessing stable housing, it is a core component of who we are to also provide shelter, hospitality, and meals. The network of congregations and community members like you who have been supporting our organization for the past 10 years didn't allow for these changes to completely change our service model. Your passion to help families and commitment to our organization inspired so much generosity and support during truly unpredictable ways times. Our partnering congregations quickly came up with some solutions and to offer hospitality and support to the families at the hotel. Eventually we even figured out a way to provide some meals. This response was later emulated by Family Promise affiliates across the country. Though

many of us may prefer to give a more personal donation or volunteer to share fellowship with families experiencing homelessness, your financial contributions and donations of supplies and gift cards have been so truly helpful in allowing us to continue supporting families in need.

A partnership with Anoka County and the Metropolitan Housing and Redevelopment Authority also gave an opportunity for us to help six families find affordable housing through a voucher program. As long as these families follow-up and complete their annual paperwork, they will have housing for the rest of their lives.

Our staff truly stepped up to keep the serving going, with a special thanks to our case manager, Sue, who ballooned her caseload to DOUBLE the average number of families at a time.

Our graduate services program has continued to grow as families are choosing to continue case management services and working towards their bigger goals and maintaining their housing independence.

We have made an offer for the new Case Manager for Family Promise in Anoka County. This new staff person will take on much of the magic Sue, has been working for the past 7 years while Sue transitions into a new role focused on housing search and stabilization. Stay tuned for more details in the very near future!

As much as 2020 was a year of the unexpected and unprecedented for Family Promise, we hope 2021 will be the year of progress and growth!

Last week, three open meetings were held to discuss the upcoming vote on Sunday, Jan. 31, at 9:30am regarding our two church properties. As a first step, to determine how church membership will move forward regarding the removal of the two portables, the congregation will be asked to vote on one of three options: Keep both properties,



sell the property on Round Lake and Bunker, or sell Nightingale. At each meeting, Greg Ackerson articulated a detailed presentation describing the data and the financial implications of each of the possible options.
