John August Swanson writes in his notes: "Peter and his friends have been fishing all night; they are tired and have not caught any fish. Someone on the beach calls out: "Put down your nets one more time. Don't give up yet." They put down their nets and they catch so many fish that the nets are almost breaking! The sunlight reflects on the clouds, the sail, and the faces of the fishermen. Over my life as an artist, I have created variations of this gospel. The story helps me to accept struggles and to appreciate the casting of my own "net" into the waves, and the surprise of experiencing the fruit and abundance that are there. We are reminded, too, of the inexhaustible resources within each of us."

Luke 5 was our Gospel text on January 24th, 2021. As we gathered for worship at church and in our homes, we heard Jesus' invitation to throw our nets back out into the sea, just a little deeper this time, and to trust. Trust that after all of our hard work has awarded us with nothing there is the possibility of abundance; trust that Jesus' promise will break us open like those nets, reminding us that indeed God is working in and through us, and God isn't done with us yet. It was later that evening I learned that Pastor Delwayne Hahn died on this day.

Pastor Hahn trusted the voice of Jesus for a long time and knew the power of the Gospel. He knew of the abundance that can come when you least expect, of the invitation to keep trusting even when it looks like there is no hope, to recognize that everything we do is not about us, but it is about reflecting the light and the love of God. I witnessed it in the year and a few months that I was privileged to work alongside Delwayne. For 51 years, Pastor Hahn served the church in ordained ministry and he trusted in the abundant life-giving promises of Jesus.

Beginnings

This is the first section of the current study I am leading with the Graceful Seniors group. Ideas were made in collaboration with Jan and Jodi Anderson.

"In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth." Genesis 1:1

The Bible contains the origin stories of who we are as people, as God's people. Often used in comic books and other popular storytelling methods, origin stories attempt to answer questions audiences have about the story's main characters. Wikipedia says this:

"In entertainment, an origin story is an account or backstory revealing how a character or group of people become a protagonist or antagonist, and it adds to the overall interest and complexity of a narrative, often giving reasons for their intentions."

I like this definition because it points to the complexity of our human stories, humans being especially complex. And our origin story is rooted in God's overall story of salvation written throughout the Bible. When I teach children and youth about the Bible, I often say, it looks like a book, but really it is a library. The Bible is full of 66 different books, each with their own writing style and voice. Some books tell stories, some give laws or teachings, others are poetry, and some talk about the end times, and others are letters to specific people in specific places. Even though there are many different forms of literature, the story arch through this library of stories contains my story and your story too! You might gather from hearing sermons and reading devotions and just spending time with me, I am completely in awe of the Biblical story and how it's stories narrative and weave through our lives. And the story God is creating, it did not end when the Biblical canon stopped collecting, that might be our biggest misunderstanding. No, God's story continued and continues to be written in our lives. This is the impetus for our study: (RE)membering Faith through our stories. We will look at some biblical stories and then are invited to write our own. You can choose to share your stories with our group, with the church by submitting it to be one of our weekly devotions on our website, or you can choose to share what you have written with your family, stories that will be treasured for generations to come. This first session is about beginnings or origins. The whole Bible could be considered an origin text telling the backstory of the people of God, but there are origin stories within this larger whole.

John 1:1-14

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

Discussion Questions

- The beginning of John's Gospel tells not of the cradle but of the cosmos. We are introduced to Jesus, the Word made flesh and lived among us. What do we learn about God from this passage?
- What does this passage tell us about Jesus?
- What does this passage reveal to us about ourselves?

Discovering your story

Not all origin stories look the same. Not only the stories we tell, but how we tell them is different. We could have chosen Genesis 1, or the more familiar Christmas story (Luke 2). We could have looked at Abraham's call (Genesis 12:1-3) or Moses' call (Exodus 3)? Or even the story of the first Christian church after Jesus' resurrection and ascension (Acts 2:37-47). These are all great examples of origin stories. Feel free to call upon these or others when you think about writing your own story.

Prompt

• Where I'm from? Think about your origins. Who are you from? Parents? Heritage? What place? When? What generation? Why? How? You need not include any of these questions in your story, they are merely there to bring a story forth.

May is National Mental Health **Awareness** Month

Mental illness affects millions of Americans and their families. Since 1949, the month of May has been designated "National Mental Health Awareness Month" to call attention to mental illness, the stigma surrounding it, and the need to support those affected by it. Because education is a critical component to eliminating this stigma and supporting all who struggle with mental health, you are invited to the following upcoming events, both presented by Chris Shaw of The Heart and Mind Connection:

Mental Health 101 - Sunday, April 25, 1:00-2:30 PM in the sanctuary

Most of us experience ups and downs related to our mental health, just as we do our physical health. What's "normal?" When is it time to seek help? This presentation will help address such questions as:

- What's the difference between feeling "anxious" and having an "anxiety disorder?"
- How do I know if a loved one is just feeling "down" or is truly "depressed?"
- What signs or symptoms should tell me that I (or a loved one) needs help?

Suicide Prevention (QPR) - Sunday, May 2, 1:00-2:30 PM in the sanctuary

QPR – Question, Persuade, and Refer – are the three steps anyone can take to help prevent a suicide. Just like CPR, QPR is an emergency response to someone in crisis and can save lives. QPR is the most widely taught "gatekeeper training" program in the United States. (Gatekeeper training teaches people to identify individuals who are showing signs of suicide risk and help them get the services they need.) This 90minute class is for anyone over the age of 16 who wants to learn best practices in suicide prevention.


