



Come and See God's Generosity

Jesus' transformation in the Gospel of John begins with a simple invitation, "Come and see." These men who become his disciples merely go and see. Unsure of who this man is and aware of all the proclamations that have been made about him: "Lamb of God," "Son of God," "Rabbi," they follow. At first blush, going to see is incredible; Jesus takes ordinary water and transforms it into the most delicious abundant wine they have ever tasted. I imagine the disciples nudging each other and nodding, "Yes! This is going to be amazing. Look at this guy!" They are right in one sense, it will be amazing, but it won't always be as fun as abundant wine. It will take hard work, including hard inner-work: asking deep questions, being willing to take risks, humility, confession and more. By the time they have seen all that Jesus has to offer, they will be transformed. They will recognize that God's blessings don't just come as abundant wine, but in abundant love and care. God's love isn't like Hallmark, there to just make us feel good; it will result in the disciples laying down their own agendas and being willing to follow Jesus to places of risk, vulnerability, suffering and pain. In the end, all of them will be transformed in new and radical ways: from followers to leaders, from God-curious to God-centered, from leaders to servants.

On the weekend of February 5th and 6th we officially kick off our **Transforming Inside and Out** generosity campaign. Some of us have been working on this since November in preparation and in prayer. When I reached out to the members of our team, I did so with an invitation to "come and see." I wanted them to ask questions, to inquire and know what they were getting into, and I also affirmed what I saw in these individuals, leaders willing to invest, be honest and who were open to transformation. November seems like a long time ago now because so much has happened as we have prepared for this weekend. I have seen members of our own team start to transform. I have seen this in their words, their passion, their commitment. I have also witnessed God's generosity, and that is the most amazing part of it all.

God has been present with us on this journey. On a day when we were struggling to make graphic design decisions, Dave from Presto Graphics stopped by the office to drop things off and answered our questions, helping us make the right decision to move forward. Christmas week, we had final edits due to our graphic designer, only for Marie to be at home sick with a fever, and yet, the team came together, worked hard, and got everything done. I realize as I write this, you might be thinking- okay, sure. That's fine. And that is what it looks like from the outside, but it feels different on the inside. I have felt pushed and stretched in new ways, and in the hardest moments, something small happens and I become aware that God is part of this entire process.

The transformation that God is doing within me is not over yet. It has only just begun. I know it won't necessarily be easy. I am hoping for a couple more abundant wine, or mountain-top experiences along the way. I am excited to not only experience God's generosity, but to share it. I am both scared and eager to see what God does within my heart, my mind, and my spirit. I also am looking forward to seeing what God will do within you.

When we finish Transforming Inside & Out, I am convinced that we at Grace Lutheran Church will have grown: grown in faith, grown as leaders, grown in love and in our spirits, grow in understanding our mission, and grown as a church because God is opening us all up to our neighborhood, to pour out love, generosity and to share our faith in radical love. So come and see.

Associate Pastor's Message



Paradox: a gift of faith

One of the things I absolutely love about our Lutheran faith is Martin Luther's teaching simul justis et peccator, Latin meaning that we are simultaneously both saint and sinner. I love this teaching, not only because of what it means for me as a Christian navigating our complex world, but also because I love the idea of paradox, two seemingly true and exclusive things existing at the same time. One might

think that wearing a Christian identity means sin is no longer an issue in the life of faith. And yet we still live in a fallen and broken world, and the church is no exception. We are both enduringly sinful and freed and forgiven with the righteousness of God. Can I get an Amen? This is a difficult thing to understand especially by those who have felt wronged by the church or by Christian people. And continues to be a barrier for many people who view the church and its members as hypocritical.

This year, in worship, we are studying the Gospel according to John. Time and again the evangelist breaks open the box of what we think we know about God and Jesus. Right when we think God is doing one thing, we are shown another possibility as well, that expands our understanding and invites us to answer yes, these are most certainly true. Even if at first glance the ideas seem contradictory. Throughout the gospel, John will use two stories usually one after the other to make his point. The first two scripture lessons we have read in John, The Wedding at Cana (2:1-11) and The Cleansing of the Temple (2:13-22) show us the Gospel and therefore the good news found within is for both insiders and outsiders. The wedding at Cana invited us to ask who is included, while the temple narrative makes us wonder who are we excluding? Both important factors when considering our own values of welcoming others, connection, and service. This pattern of revelation continues through the Gospel pairing light and darkness, life, and death, from above and from below, the now and not yet. I find so much hope in paradox, in the idea of "both" "and." Especially in a world that is increasingly divided on so many things. Can we pause and wonder if things aren't mutually exclusive, if two things can both be true? Can we hold space for differing opinions?

Scholars note that the Gospel of John was written to a community who debated the identity of Jesus. A central theme in John is the question, who is this man? The Jewish people of the time wondered if Jesus was in fact the Messiah or if this man's claims were blasphemy. Jesus, on multiple occasions will use the term "I AM" referring to himself and connecting him to the divine. At the same time proving himself the Messiah of Israel's tradition and expanding to the growing and diverse Christian community that also included Samaritan and Greek believers. The inclusion of gentile believers not only means we are included into the family of God, but others too! Once again expanding the reach of the message of God and our understanding of who God is and what God is up to in our world. This reflection is an invitation to you to keep your eyes, mind, and heart open, as together we journey through the Gospel of John. How is God expanding your understanding of who God is, who you are, and deepening your relationship with the divine, our neighbors, and the world around us?

STEWARDSHIP

As a Vision Board member I was asked to write a piece for this edition of Grace Notes. Being a new member, I really had no idea of what to write. Then I looked back at how I got here. I have been a member of Grace for more than 20 years, attending services fairly regularly, serving on the ushering team, attending some of the church sponsored events and helping out with various other events, set up, teardowns etc., but I have not been as active as many of the members at Grace are. Then, last May I was asked if I would put my name in for the Vision Board election. It seemed that there were three openings and only three candidates running. The nominating committee felt that they needed to give the members more choices. I agreed without any real expectation that I would be elected. I submitted a short resume outlining my background as a small, independent business owner and experience on municipal and industry committees. It was pretty clear that I did not have the background with charitable and religious organizations that many of the other candidates had. I was therefore surprised when I was elected by the very narrowest of margins. I approached this responsibility with a fair amount of trepidation because I never considered myself to be overly religious or spiritual. While having a deep belief in God; and understanding that he is in every aspect of our lives, I was not sure how well I would be able to fulfill these responsibilities.

As it turns out, I think God had a plan. It soon became obvious that over the next three years a large part of the Vision Boards responsibilities will be overseeing the capital campaign and church building project. Having spent the last forty years working with architects, engineers, construction trades and finance teams, I believe these are some of the talents that will be needed.

When we talk of stewardship, the gifts of time, treasure and talent often come up. God gave all of us these gifts, some more than others. We all have used these gifts for our own benefit. But the question is how much of these God given gifts have we used to give back and worship God? Some can dedicate more time to helping others, serving in the community and church, working on church projects, supporting mission projects, etc. Some can use their talents whether it is physical, personal or professional skills, to help further God's plans. Then the tough question is how much treasure does God want us to use for his works?

In answering this question, we must first acknowledge that all our time, talents and treasures are a gift from God. We may have used the time, talent and the ability that God gave us to work hard to earn these treasures, but without these gifts we would have nothing. (Luke 12:48) "From everyone to whom much has been given, much will be required; and from the one to whom much has been entrusted, even more will be demanded."

As we began our capital campaign, please consider that everything we have is a gift from God. We have been given the opportunity to give back to God and further his works. By this point I hope you are aware that we need to raise approximately 1.2 million dollars to move ahead with our plan #2 that will address most of our current requirements.

However, I firmly believe that this congregation has the ability to raise more than this, which would let us consider Plan #3 with the new, larger fellowship hall, expanded narthex, new kitchen, additional storage along with better utilization of existing space, etc. This will also help meet our future requirements. Many have asked, can we build plan #2 now and add Plan #3 in the future? The answer is yes, at a much higher cost than if we do it now.

As we kick off this capital campaign, I ask that you pray on this and consider all that God has given to us and what we can give back. God Bless.

Stephanie's Story: Breaking the Generational Cycle of Homelessness

2021 has been another year of change for Family Promise and the families we serve, and we are grateful for your creativity and steadfastness--thank you, volunteers and donors!

Every family comes to Family Promise with a unique story under different circumstances. Most recently, we helped Stephanie's family move from homelessness to housing independence. Stephanie is a young mom of two sweet boys. She first experienced homelessness as a young teen when her parents lost their housing. For five years, she lived with different relatives and on friends' couches. She was eight months pregnant when she and her not-quite-two-year-old entered the Family Promise shelter program in May.

"Amazing people" is how Stephanie describes Family Promise staff and church volunteers. When Stephanie's second child was born in June, our community was there to support her. She received many donated items.

Unlike many families experiencing homelessness, Stephanie can count on her best friend to jump in to help her with some daily tasks, such as childcare, when needed. "The difference that one or two reliable support people make can change the trajectory of someone's life," says Karla.

Stephanie's family moved into their new apartment in October. With the support of our community—donated items from IKEA Twin Cities, a move-in basket from our friends at Zion Lutheran Church, and furniture from Bridging—she had all her household needs. Settling into her first home, she is excited, energized, and confident. With her new budget skills and income--"I really do make this much!"--she is determined to manage her monthly bills and save money, too.

"Family Promise gave me a safe haven; they wrapped their arms around me. I am so grateful this program was open to me," says Stephanie.




Boy Scout Pancake Breakfast
