

Transforming Inside & Out



March is always a big month for me. It's my birthday and my anniversary. I turn 45 years old on March 3rd and I will have been married for 21 years on March 16th. Those feel like pretty big milestones and yet, I have a feeling they will pass by as most of the events from this year have with a card and a nice meal, and some quiet time with my family. Nothing huge, nothing over the top. Transitioning into middle age, and into these middle years of marriage feel different than I thought they would. I don't need the celebration and the grandeur as much as I need the solid, dependable relationships in my life. I don't need the big anniversary weekend as much as I need the connection and care that I receive day after day from my husband. And yet, I recognize that this hasn't always been true. There were years when Jeff signing my birthday card in front of me, made me super angry. "Can't you be more prepared?!" I asked. There were years when planning a weekend away was imperative to the health of our marriage. I am not saying weekends away are not still important, or kind ges-

tures are a thing of the past, or even presents, but what I long for now is more presence with my own loved ones, with people both in and out of the church and with God.

The thing about March, however, while significantly important in my life is that I often feel it is the ugliest month of the year. The snow melts, the grass is brown and muddy if we can see it at all. It's slushy and messy, and we are all done with winter. Even if we get a nice day- which has happened (it's been 70 on my birthday before) it is still ugly in the state of Minnesota. March is a month of transformation. Beneath the slush, and the snow, or the mud, the warmth of the sun is transforming our world from winter to spring. New life starts to germinate in March. New possibilities, new hopes realized. But before we can get to Forsythia, Daffodils of April, or the Lilacs of May, we first must wade through the mud.

Transformation is something that often happens in the dark. Be it the cocoon of the caterpillar where a butter-fly is hatched, or a seed bursting forth beneath the ground, or the spirit of a person finding forgiveness and renewal. On the surface, you can't see the transformation happening. Transformation doesn't happen without death and darkness. Something new cannot be born until we are willing to put something else to rest.

Throughout the month of February, we have been celebrating generosity and looking into the future of what God is calling us to do at Grace. We have heard important testimonies about the ways that Grace has been a family to so many people throughout the years, providing care, nurturing, and spiritual growth for all. We have great visions of what God is calling us to do next. But today, we wait in the darkness. It's March (or almost) and because of that we can't quite see the transformation that is happening inside ourselves or within our church. It is happening within. And yet, I believe it is happening. I can feel it!

In walking this path of transformation together, I have already been changed. Changed by your faithfulness. Changed by your commitment and dedication to this church. Changed by your belief that God is still working and moving in and through the hearts and people of Grace. As I listened to Pastor Maria preach on February 13th, she pointed out that the Gospel writer wasn't interested in the miracle or describing it, but in the people, being fed, being filled, being satisfied. The people being transformed in generosity and love. Yes! This is what it is all about! How has God transformed you to see others? How has God moved in you to share what you have with the world around you? How has God stretched you to look at the ugliness of the world or March, and believe that something beautiful is happening underneath the surface?

This March there are big things happening, and it's not just about me and my birthday and anniversary. It is about how God is transforming Grace inside and out. And so we are going to celebrate. Celebrate generosity by coming together on Commitment Weekend March 5th and 6th and sharing what we have been stretched to give in whatever amount, and ask God to bless it and bless us. On March 19th/20th and 26th/27th we are going to celebrate! Why two weekends? Because even in Lent, even in March, we need to celebrate all that God has given us and how God has been present with us in this journey of faith and this transformation. I hope that you will be here, because our family at Grace is not complete without you, and what I desire more than anything is your presence as, together we celebrate the abundant gifts of our transforming God. LISTEN | GROW | SERVE Our Lenten Journey by Pastor Maria Markman

"Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God, the Lord is one! Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your strength." -Deuteronomy 6:4-5

This Lent, join us as we learn all about The Shema. The Shema, literally translated, hear or listen! is an ancient prayer of the people of God. First given through Moses before the Israelites entered into the promised land and continuing to be used even to this day as a sort of creed in the Jewish faith. This ancient prayer is lifted up by Jesus' teachings as well. Although I had read these words in the Bible numerous times throughout my life, it wasn't until I was in the Holy Land March 2020 with my mother (pictured here at the wailing wall in Jerusalem) that I realized it's practicality and significance in the life of everyday faith.





Whenever we entered a Jewish home or business, we would see these small, often decorative containers on the doorframes. In Jewish homes, families will place a mezuzah (decorative cases) on each of the doorframes of their home as a symbol of their faith. A Mezuzah holds, written within it, The Shema. It serves as a reminder for those in the home of God's covenant and promises to God's people. And for those who do not live there, it is a marker of the faithful who live there, that the people who reside there have certain beliefs and practices.

The Shema is also a sign post for us in our faith. A practical way to live out our faith in the world. When the people of God first received the commandments from Moses, they were reminded through these words that God's commands will be inscribed on their hearts and lived out. Then it should be taught to their children and handed down through generations. Grace, as a congregation whose mission is to be "a community of faith united by God's love to listen, grow and serve in the name of Jesus, so that all might experience grace," let us listen and grow in our understanding of this prayer throughout Lent and how it's meaning might inspire us to serve in Jesus name, so that all might experience grace! You won't want to miss out on our worship, educational and fellowship opportunities -join us!



Devotion: Intersectionality & Empathy

Over the past couple years, the concept of intersectionality—this framework for understanding how the intersections of different aspects and identity create unique experiences—continues to come up through-

out my life. One of the things I love about intersectionality is that it acknowledges that we are all unique human beings and most of us have both advantages and disadvantages based on our complex identities. At the November Conversations on Race & Culture we did an exercise where we identified all our various identities and reflected on the ways those identities become more or less visible or felt at different times, how those identities impact the way we perceive ourselves and how others perceive or treat us. One thing that stood out to me was that the identities that I most keenly identify with, such as being a Christian and a mom, are not things that people would necessarily know just looking at me-but I carry those identities with me and they impact how I live and experience my life, and how I treat and consult others.

In Genesis 1:26-27, God said, "Let us make human beings in our image, to be like us..." So God created human beings in God's own image...

As I reflect on intersectionality, our similarities and our differences, seen and unseen, and how complex we all are, it always seems to circle back to **empathy**. I was recently reading the book "Peaceful Parent, Happy Kids" by Dr. Laura Markham and rather than defining empathy as "seeing things from the other person's point of view," she defines empathy as "feeling from the other person's point of view." As we go through life, let's keep an open mind and be kind to others-we rarely know all of their complex identities and what they're going through. After all, Christ calls upon us to love our neighbors as ourselves.

Let's pray together...

Source of Life, in Your wisdom You have made each of us a unique treasure; cause us to flow with courage, strength, and compassion to live our stories openly, proudly, and joyfully. Presence of Love, may we embrace ourselves, our partners, our lovers, our friends, our children, our dear ones with the power of Your unending, boundless love. Spirit of Peace and Wholeness, open our eyes to the gifts and blessings we offer and receive from each other; open our hearts to welcome each other fully and truly; open our hands to embrace, to support, to lift each other with joy, song, peace, and deep friendship. 

"I Have Called You by Name"

– The Practice

As part of the capital campaign team, I had the opportunity to attend and participate in the various events held prior to the "Transforming Inside & Out" Kickoff Weekend. As part of each event, those who attended were asked to think about, discuss, and share how they have been transformed (by God) through Grace Lutheran Church. This is a tough question to answer much less share aloud with others.

A common response among people who have been at Grace for several years was that they first were impacted by Pastor Mark knowing their names after visiting our church just once. Many commented about being welcomed by name by Pastor Mark the second visit and being shocked by his fantastic memory. It is amazing to hear the impact this talent had on so many people, and yet I am not surprised. It IS powerful to be known and called by name. I experienced this myself at Grace with Pastor Mark as well as another person on staff who unexpectedly greeted our family at our first Christmas Eve service at Grace.

These stories of being seen and remembered are important, and I have been pondering what they tell us about who God is, who we are, and what more we might do now at Grace. Pastor Mark was "mirroring" for us the broader image of how God works: God sees us, knows us, and calls each of us by name. This is the first step for many of us - experiencing a God who sees us, knows us and loves us just as we are. However, this is just the beginning! There is more for us to do! I think that we are being asked to expand our perspective and for each of us extend this gift of welcoming to others. What does being welcoming look like for people visiting Grace in 2022? What new story might we share with them about how God has been at work in and through the community at Grace?

Those of you who know me might say that I have the "gift of gab", particularly when talking with strangers. I do love talking with strangers, and yet I am actually an introvert who has simply practiced talking with people I don't know. I am horrible at remembering names, but I am not afraid to ask someone their name again. Wearing masks for months gave me an excuse for not recognizing someone or knowing their name. I think most of us would say that we feel awkward and uncomfortable reaching out to people we don't know well. However, we *can* do this "work" (we can practice!) and we will get better as we use these skills. As individuals we can reach out to people we don't know by name (... yet). The next time you are at Grace, please look around and ask yourself: Who do I not recognize? Who do I not know by name? Who would I like to meet? Who do I know who lives alone and would enjoy even a brief conversation? Who is standing alone and could be included in my group or conversation? Who looks like they would like to make a new friend? How can I welcome someone else because I know firsthand what it's like to feel welcomed and to call Grace my church home?

As I think about this invitation to reach out to others, I view this practice in the context of our "Transforming Inside & Out" Generosity campaign. Being welcoming is another way of being generous with others.

Loving God – we acknowledge that we each have unique gifts and talents and that we are all siblings in Christ. Help us to view a stranger as a sibling in Christ. Help us to do hard and uncomfortable things and to generously reach out to others, as You first reached out to us. Help us to extend the spirit and gift of welcome to all people. In Your name we pray. Amen

An Exciting Youth Outreach Opportunity at Grace!

Did you notice that \$5,000 of our tithe money from the land sale of the land went to an organization called "Treehouse"? Treehouse Ministries is a Minnesota based or-TREEHOUSE ganization that is working to end hopelessness in young people, one youth at a time. TreeHouse has been serving teens since 1979, helping them build relationships and resiliency rooted in living hope. Every week teens across the state gather in host homes that provide a meal and safe space for them to find support and belonging. Through mentorships, retreats, and other off-site activities, teens have the opportunity to build even deeper relationships with peers and caring adults.

Anoka County is facing a mental health crisis with our young people and Grace Lutheran Church is exploring how we can help by opening our doors and hosting a weekly support/community group for teens in our area. But to do this we need help from the Congregation in the form of drivers, people to provide meals, and mentors for these young people. This is an amazing opportunity and we know Grace is up for the challenge. The gift of the tithe money, generously given, will pay to fund this program at Grace for up to 3 years. Thank you! GRACE 4 RAKAI UPDATE

Schools are open again over in Rakai, Uganda! After one of the longest school closures around the world caused by the global COVID pandemic, schools re-opened again on January 10th in Rakai.

The African Children Today (ACT) Junior School (pre-school thru Grade7) welcomed back nearly 700 students and the new ACT High School (grades 8-13) opened their doors for the first time with more than 250 students. Many of the high school students are sponsored by members of the Grace community. Thank you: your generous support is so needed and appreciated!

As you can imagine, there is incredible excitement in the air as the children are returning to school and reuniting with their friends and teachers. ACT continued to pay the salaries of the teachers at the ACT Junior School throughout the pandemic. The teachers prepared study packets for the children at home, delivered weekly via the ACT staff on motorcycles. As a result, the children not only maintained their educational status during the pandemic, but have continued to grow and advance while schools were closed! This is how distance learning was adapted for Rakai, where there is no internet. Amazing how the Spirit has worked in this community!

With schools open once again, there is a great need to recruit more sponsors for children in the program who have lost their sponsors during the pandemic. 


