Breaking Ground

It feels like we have been in an endless holding pattern for our building project. After hopes of breaking ground this Spring, we are now looking at a late September or October date. I am praying that we are able to get all of the exterior work done before the ground freezes. Even though we



have been in this holding pattern, I am filled with gratitude. Our congregation just voted to move ahead with taking out our mortgage of \$2.2 million. This number seems huge and it is large, but it covers our project and then some. It allows us to have the contingencies we need. We also do not need to take out the full amount. Because of this vote, we will close on the loan soon and then we will be set to go. All of the preparation work that has been done by the building task force has been amazing. I am also so thankful for the hard work and diligence of Tracie Russell, our Church Administrator. She is thoroughly leading us through this process and making sure all of our ducks are in a row.

While I am hopeful that we will be able to have an actual date to break ground in the near future, I do feel that we are turning the page on a new chapter here at Grace Lutheran. Our church is filled with new life. In the midst of transition there is good energy. We have a new CYF Director Will Weikle, a new Childcare Director, Christine Klersy, and Scott Christensen has stepped up volunteering his time as Outreach Ministry Team Leader. I am excited to work with these gifted and committed individuals as we continue to serve our community in so many ways. I believe that there will be some ground breaking ministry happening here at Grace and I am hopeful about where God will lead us.

There are two things that I want to lift up for you in terms of ministry at Grace. First is that I have heard an ongoing request for an evening Bible Study. We are offering one this year on Wednesday nights that will be led by Pastor Maria or me. Please join us. Come for a week or two and see if it fits your needs. We want to help people read and study the Bible. I will be honest, in this day and age there are so many different ways to do it. I primarily use my Bible app when I go on visits because of the font size. I will also use different translations from the Bible app to help me explore a text, and I even have the narrator read aloud to me when I drive. All of these methods enhance my faith and help me be immersed in the word of God. I also use my study Bible and many resources to further my understandings.

Second is a grief group. Our church is looking at leading a grief group this fall and using a resource called Grief Share. The person who was planning on leading for us is no longer able to, and so I am hoping that you might prayerfully consider if this is something you want to learn more about. My hope is that we will be offering this class starting sometime in October. As someone who has buried a mother and also walked alongside my dad and so many others in grief, I believe without question that providing support and resources for the grieving is an essential component of ministry. I believe God will provide, even as we wait for a leader, and I want to assure you that we are committed to helping those who are grieving and those who are leading.

I hope that you will continue to pray for Grace Lutheran Church as we anticipate all of the ground-breaking opportunities on the horizon.

Associate Pastor's Message

Routines, Practices, and Habits

It is the end of August as I write to you all. And it is at this point in the summer that I have always fallen apart. As a kid, I was very dysregulated and grouchy. I was ready to go back to school, to see my friends, to have a routine. As a youth, swimming practice two-adays had begun and I was constantly hungry and sore, but grateful for a routine even if it did include long breaks in the middle of the day lounging on the couch before practice in the afternoon. Even then I craved the routine of going back to the classroom, seeing friends and getting a syllabus, a schedule and order for my life. Throughout all my years, even to this day, the siren song of the store's school supply section beckons to me promises of organiza-



tion and regulation: calendars, notebooks, pens, pencils, and highlighters, folders, whatever "new" system that would get my life back to order.

Even though I am no longer in school, recently I have admitted on several accounts that I am a mess! My best friend reminded me when she is a mess she returns to the habits and practices she has to set her on course. It wasn't until she reminded me of this that I remembered one of the reasons I love fall so much. Summer is so much fun and filled with endless sun and possibility. But I can only handle this discombobulation for so long. This summer was no different: vacations, Vacation Bible School, Summer Stretch, Middle School and High School trips, and all the other sporadic church and not church events. I am now ready for the routine of fall. Returning to my habits and practices. And getting my life out of this mess and back in order!

We have habits and practices as a community that get us back on track too. The routine of fall programming. The return to the Narrative Lectionary which begins each fall in Genesis and leads us through God's story told in the Old Testament until Christmas when we arrive at the New Testament through the rest of the school year. What I absolutely love about the beginning of the Bible is that it grounds us in the creation story. A story of order from chaos. Sounds a lot like the return to routine in Fall. The first creation story walks us through God's creation of all that is. First, God creates the containers: the sky, land, and sea. And in the following days God will fill those containers with stars, sun, and moon, with plants and trees, with birds, fish, and creepy crawling creatures, and finally humans. God takes the chaos and gives it structure and brings it to order. The second creation story focuses on getting back to work. Humans receive our practices and routines. The message translation says "God took the Man and set him down in the Garden of Eden to work the ground and keep it in order" (Genesis 2:15). This is how we begin our Fall together, getting back to our routines, practices and habits.

I wonder if you feel this way at the end of Summer and beginning of Fall. The call to return to routine and habit. Possibly having spent a lot of time away from home on summer vacations and at the lake? Or adding extra outings? Having the kids home from school for the summer figuring out each week which camp or friend's house they are staying at? Maybe getting up earlier or staying up later with the sun? Letting normal chores give way to beautiful summer days outside in Minnesota? Personally, I know I need this fall return to routines, practices and habits. I need to exercise every day with extra walks for Chandler as needed. I need my morning quiet time in gratitude and devotion, to eat three healthy meals a day (less ice cream), and to intentionally live out my purpose through my work and play. I need to make my bed and tidy my house every day and make sure my sink is clean in the evening. Brush my teeth twice a day. Keep up with my laundry weekly, vacuuming and watering my house plants, and to see my therapist regularly. And check in with friends and family. I meet with my peer group of pastors at least once a month. Returning to routines, practices, and habits also means less time on screens and more time in nature. Less time watching TV and more time learning new things. All these routines, practices, and habits help me return to stability and feel connected to God and to others. What are your routines? Will you consider adding a new routine, habit, or practice this year by joining us for worship each week, or Bible study? Maybe begin a new giving practice or volunteer in an outreach ministry? - Pastor Maria Markman

At the end of July, I had the privilege to travel with 14 high schoolers and 6 other adults to Appalachia, VA, in the wooded mountains and old mining towns, to work on home repairs with Appalachia Service Project (ASP). The ASP theme for this summer was "Love Strong" based upon Luke 10:27

"Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind and Love your neighbor as yourself" (NIV)





We were the last crew for the summer, which meant that we got to complete the projects for the homeowners, and what a rewarding experience that was! We served people who would have been unable to pay for, and complete the work on their own. And as the finished projects were revealed throughout the week, the looks on the homeowners' faces and their abundant gratitude made a lasting impact on both the students and chaperones.

In our devotion time over lunch, while sitting in a shady spot near a creek, we talked about generosity and how generosity is defined. Our crew defined generosity as giving freely without expecting anything in return. One of the homeowners told stories about just that – how they went out of their way to help others and when those people would ask how they could return the favor or pay them back, they said they wanted nothing but for them to pay it forward.

Just as we stand on the shoulders of those who came before us, our youth stand on our shoulders. Throughout the week we got to bear witness to these amazing teenagers' generosity. They gave it their all – in their work, in their willingness to learn, in their daily chores, and in the way they cared for the homeowners, each other and even us chaperones! It was so uplifting to work alongside these incredible human beings and watch them grow in so many ways.

These young people are the future of our world and the future of our church. And what I've learned this week is that if we invest in them, they will flourish and impact many more lives than we ever could on our own. So next time you're at church, take some time to introduce yourself to any of the young people there. Get to know them, remember their names, and build those relationships. You'll be so glad you did — I know I am!

Devotion

I wrote this devotion and shared with the large group one morning while on the Grace High School mission trip to Appalachia Service Project (ASP) in August.

Hello, my name is Nancy Jenkins and I am with the group from Grace Lutheran Church in Andover, MN, which is a northern suburb of Minneapolis. Today I am sharing something that I wrote early one morning this week.

Let me start by saying that I am not a pastor, I have not attended seminary, and I have no formal training on the Bible. However, as some of you know from Grace know, I have a habit of volunteering for things at church, I enjoy writing, and I am part of a weekly Zoom Bible study at our church that raises far more questions than it ever finds answers to. Often, we see the stories of the Bible in a new light of God's abundant grace and love.

Speaking of questions, let me start with some questions. Do you ever feel too small or too insignificant for God's love and care for you? Do you ever feel not good enough or outside the reach of God's love?



Recently I have been pondering the story of the wheat and the weeds from the Gospel of Matthew 13. In short, Jesus was answering the question, "should we get rid of the weeds while trying to grow wheat?" And Jesus tells them no, let both wheat and weeds remain and let them both grow until harvest.

Our human minds are so quick to label and judge: wheat is good; weeds are bad. This dividing, judging, and labeling ability wasn't just an issue in Jesus' time. We do this all the time in our modern world: this person is right and good; another person is wrong and bad. Some people interpret the weeds in this story as evil people. However, even in this very text Jesus points out a good aspect of the weeds: later the weeds can be used to burn for fire. Perhaps this fire would have been used to warm their living space or for cooking.

What fascinates me is that in the very next section of Matthew, Jesus refers to weeds again and encourages us to have the faith of a very specific weed: a mustard seed. Jesus lifts up a weed as an example of how to live a life of faith. This weed, from its tiny seed (less than a 12th of an inch) can grow to become a tree 20-30' tall tree with a wide canopy. Jesus, seemingly trying to ensure that we understand the size and scope of this weed once it's fully grown, said that even birds perch in the branches of a mustard tree. This is another way Jesus seems to affirm the innate goodness, beauty, and purpose of this weed.

Both of these stories or examples in Matthew were told in response to the question, "what is the kingdom of heaven like?" Jesus' answer? The kingdom of heaven is like the tiny mustard seed: no thing and no person is too small for God's eyes and vision. In addition, all are included, even what (or who) we humans label as "weeds". God can reach all people in radical and beautiful ways. No one is outside of God's plans, God's grace, or God's love.

Let's pray. Loving God who sees and loves all people - we give you thanks for this day and for all that it holds. Thank you that nothing is too small or too big for you. Give us eyes to see your great love for all people. Fill us with your loving presence. We trust in your boundless grace and goodness. In your name we pray. Amen.




