As a person who is type A and a planner, I like to know the details and how things will be. I want to make sure "Our faith invites us to everything will fit. However, I have had to let go of that during this project. I have had to trust the team has made the right decisions and trust that God has guided the process. It's hard sometimes to do this. I want control things. I want to plan. I want to have a layout and assurance of everything. Our faith invites us to live in the mystery. It invites us to re-imagine the ways we interact with each other, the ways we do ministry, the ways we show up. I think of Abraham in Genesis 12 who was told to leave what was familiar and trust God to lead him into a new land. And I think of the first Apostles in Acts 1 who were waiting for the gift of the Holy Spirit. Both of these biblical stories point to ways God invites us to let go of what is familiar and to trust and move into a new time and place.

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I believe this is what God is doing with us here at Grace. Inviting us to let go of the familiar and leading us into a new reality. I am mindful that both Abraham and the Apostles continued to practice their faith in the ways they understood. They prayed, they listened, they gathered as a community. But when Abraham would have an experience of God out in the world, he started to make new altars in all these places. Recognizing that God is in this new territory and God doesn't reside in the past but is leading him into the future.



Hello Grace family! Can you feel the transformation?

My life has been transforming ever since our family stepped foot into Grace Lutheran Church eight years ago, and my faith has been renewed thanks to the people of Grace. When our kids were little and hesitant to go to Sunday school, you took them by the hand and helped them feel safe. When my daughter's daycare shutdown with only 9 months to go until kindergarten, you opened your arms and welcomed her to Seeds of Grace. When this mama needed a break to focus on self-care, you invited me to a women's retreat and filled me with love, peace, and joy. When our family experienced loss and grief, you lifted us up in prayer and cared for us. And even when I wasn't in need, God showed up through our youth and opened my eyes in new ways as I worked alongside them to care for the people of Appalachia, VA. I can feel God's transforming presence here at Grace – in the messages, in the music, in the prayers, in the work, and in the PEOPLE... all of you!

Friends, we are at an inflection point do we do things at Grace the way we always have...or do we reimagine what Grace could be? The Vision Board recently started reading the book Faithful Innovation, Leading Zscheile, Binder & Pinkstaff, and the introduction invites us to move from "church questions" (How do we fix our church?) to "God questions" (Where do we notice God in our everyday lives?). I would invite you to contemplate these "God questions" with us:

- What might God be up to in the lives of our neighbors?
- How might the Spirit be moving in the lives of our members or calling us to join the work God is already doing in the neighborhood?
- What difference does Jesus make to you personally, to the life of Grace, and to our world?
- What are our neighbors looking for and how might the gospel of Jesus speak to those longings?

As I begin my presidency, I've been pondering these questions myself. And do you know what – I don't have all the answers! Throughout my faith journey I have wrestled with this concept, afraid to talk to people about my faith because they might ask me a question that I don't have the answer to. I've now accepted that it's ok not to have all the answers! We simply have to be open to the conversation, seek to understand and be willing to share our story of how God has touched our lives.

I'm not sure what God is up to in the lives of our neighbors, but there are several ways I see God working in my life and the lives of those around me through the people God has placed in our lives at unique times, through the challenges we've faced (that I can now look back on and see God at work), through our roles as a parent/spouse/ child/sibling, through our journeys, and even through what might feel like insignificant interactions with strangers. And that is just in the lives close to me! God is weaving these stories across the world.

So how do we discover what God is up to in the lives of our neighbors? We start by showing up - going to school festivals, events, theater shows, sporting events, coffee shops, the library, and other places in the community (many of which we're already visiting anyway) and engaging with our neighbors. We can show God's love simply through the way we interact with our neighbors, the questions we ask, the interest we show in them, and our compassion. And through those conversations, we can learn more about what our neighbors are looking for and how Grace can meet them where they are at.

God is at work here at Grace and outside our walls. Are you open to transformation?

Anyone stepping into Grace lately has noticed the transformation, a transformation that in many ways exceeds our imaginations. There is a lot to get used to and even more to give thanks for! Over the last month, I interviewed a few folks, asked them about their experience of our building project and invited them to reimagine our future together at Ghace! out some of their responses below!

Charlie Wold: A 40-year member of Grace and currently, our building project volunteer owner's representative. In this role, Charlie monitors the work being done, answers questions the contractors might have, coordinates their building efforts with the church and preschool, runs errands, and he writes on the progress for Grace at a Glance.

Anny Howard: Anny and her husband Nick distinctly remember their first Sunday at Grace because it was our Transforming Inside and Out Sunday. Members apologized saying, "this might not be the best Sunday to test out our church," but Anny disagrees! She felt it was so GREAT to see a congregation starting something. All three of the Howard kids are Seeds of Grace kids, although their oldest is in elementary school now!

Anne Marie Johnson: Anne Marie and her late husband Harland live in the neighborhood behind Grace. They did not always attend Grace but since attending for a few years have found a wonderful church home and community. Anne Marie likes to use the term family.

Maria: What difference will this make for you, for your family, for Grace, for the community?

Anny: I feel more comfortable being able to go to work. I really like my job. I am a teacher. It is a huge part of my identity. I can continue to work because I feel so comfortable where they are at.

Anne Marie: My life has been turned upside down since losing Harland. But I am grateful to Grace, my church family, to our pastors for their spiritual direction, and all the ministries that support our community, especially the kids! I like the ministry we provide at Grace. If someone says, "It's not for me." you aren't looking hard enough. The building project will allow us to give so much more to each other and our community.

Charlie: It's going to be a wonderful legacy we are leaving for those that follow. I think the congregation will find what has been done here to be really workable. As people come in for church on Sunday or Wednesday there will be so much more space for gathering. It is going to be remarkable! We will really be able to bring the neighborhood in too.

Maria: What should we be thinking about in terms of reimagination as our outer transformation gets closer to completion?

Charlie: We have a new space, which is physical. But how do we use this new physical space to broaden our ministries?

The building is the bones. And now we can start to enhance it to fit the programs and culture we want to exhibit here.

Anne Marie: My hope is that we will keep on going. Let us not get stale, thinking, that is enough. But to keep going. Can we find more opportunities to serve together?

Anny: I feel like kids are a priority here. Through the project that priority is still very strong. As my kids grow, my hope is that there will be a space for them then too. A space for strong connections with kids that may or may not go to their school but who also have a shared love and faith.

Maria: Has anything surprised you?

Anny: I was a little surprised at how much relief. I felt about knowing the entrance to Seeds of Grace is its own entrance. It feels more secure as far as who is coming and going. I don't like that I feel relieved by that, so it surprised me. I like that it was prioritized in our project.

Anne Marie: Since I spend my summers at the lake, it's not fair. I am not seeing the daily and weekly transformations! I appreciate every time new pictures are shared about the progress. It is coming together, that doesn't surprise me, but it's exciting.

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Maria: Where have you seen God at work?

Charlie: That is a good question. It is something I have thought of more than I ever have. (Maria: Why do you think that is?) Cuz, I am working in His house. We are doing something big here. Are we doing it right? Am I doing it right? I have been praying about that.

Anny: Just bringing us here was pretty awesome. We tried a bunch of places and then Covid and when we were looking for a daycare, we came here. Sandy, the Director asked if we had a church. If not to check out a service. It seemed like everything was aligning. We liked the daycare. We felt welcomed at church. We came back. It wasn't a question; it was just placed before us. Here is where you will send your kids. Here is where you will go to church. Here is your new community of people. And here it is close to home, bonus! And it all happened at once.

Anne Marie: In everything, definitely in Harland in his last days. Up here at the lake. At Seeds of Grace, daily as those kids are surrounded by people who care! Through our pastors and the people sharing God's love!

Maria: Anything else?

Charlie: I have seen a great deal of transformation in those I have been working with and those that come into our facility. I have to believe that they believe the dollars they contributed to this project are doing something, not just to the building but to themselves. I am not alone in feeling transformed. It goes through all the people that enter this building. We should see a real renaissance in all that attend, and in all that walk through these doors.

BRICKS OF OUR MINISTRY CHILDREN, YOUTH & FAMILY

As the Children, Youth and Family Director, it felt good when I started seeing youth group attendance rise. I felt cool when the youth started to bring their friends to Youth Group. That must mean I am doing a good job. Because that's supposed to be the point, right? The more people you get into those church doors, the better job you're doing. The more you get kids to think Jesus is hip and cool and fun, the better Youth Director you are. Right?

I started Seminary last January. This summer, I had the privilege of taking a class in Berlin about Dietrich Bonhoeffer, an influential German theologian who grew up and began his ministry amidst the rise of the Nazi party in the 1920s and 30s. He was particularly focused on children and youth ministry during his ministerial years. He resisted Adolf Hitler, was involved in a conspiracy against the Nazi government, and was eventually killed in a concentration camp.

Bonhoeffer would argue getting more kids to Youth Group or getting kids to think Jesus is cool isn't the point. We often get so hung up on numbers and attendance. We feel scared about the future of the church when we see attendance decline, or when VBS doesn't look the same as it did 10 years ago. We feel our egos boosted when we fill up the pews on a Sunday morning, or when the kids at Youth Group bring their friends.

Rather, Bonhoeffer would challenge us to think about community in a different light. His first doctoral thesis, Sanctorum Communio (Communion of the Saints), claims that every aspect of "community" is essentially related to the concept of personhood. So, rather than focusing on the size of the community, or the shared interests of the community, or even what is being taught in the community, Bonhoeffer lifts up a community of personalism. This is a community where the individual is lifted up and is known by and through the community, of which is built upon the foundation of Jesus Christ.

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I look forward to the new program year. I look forward to building the new Youth Room with the high schoolers. I look forward to our partnerships with other churches. I look forward to seeing the new and the returning adult volunteers work with love and care with our youth. I look forward to seeing the new friendships blossom and old friendships strengthen. I look forward to being a part of this community that is built upon the foundation of Jesus Christ's love for us.
