Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people.


One of the things I enjoy about volunteering is interacting with people, both at Grace and in our community. As part of our "Transforming Inside & Out" generosity campaign, we have heard many stories of God's generosity. Let me share with you some of the stories I have witnessed firsthand.

This past spring I had the opportunity to go with Scott Christensen, our Director of Outreach, to Stepping Stone, an emergency housing shelter located in Anoka. Because he hadn't been to their facility before, Scott had arranged for the two of us to have a tour. When we finished the tour, Scott asked if we could also see the Director of Stepping Stone. Scott hadn't told anyone there that he had

brought with him a check for \$5,000 for Stepping Stone as part of our tithe from the capital campaign. Scott presented the check to the director and our tour guide, and the look on their faces was surprise, pure joy, and gratitude. Our tour guide, who is also a pastor, then turned to me and said, "There are a lot of churches who claim to be 'missional', but your church actually does it! This is so cool!"

One of our first improvements during the building project was to enhance the speakers and sound system in the sanctuary. There were two smaller speakers and two larger speakers (think huge!) that were taken down from the ceiling. David Phelps, our Worship Director, was looking for a way to give these outdated speakers away so that they wouldn't end up in a landfill. Somehow, strangely, I remembered that a kid from Lord of Life had told me during VBS the summer of 2023 that he loved





speakers, I texted his mom to see if they might be interested in our speakers. His mom texted back, "Yes!" Declan's mom told him about the smaller set of speakers, but she kept the huge set as a surprise until he came to Grace. When I showed him the huge Bose speakers stored in the church garage, Declan was ecstatic! His whole face lit up! His mom told me later that Declan kept saying to her, "Why did Nancy reach out to ME? Why me, of all the people?" She said that giving Declan those speakers made him feel like an "MVP!"

The truth is that I see God at work often in little ways too. For example, one time I was moving a table in the garage at church with another volunteer and we realized that we needed tape to keep the table legs in place. My friend said, "what we need is some tape!" I looked up and there on the shelf in front of me was a roll of tape! We both smiled and laughed at the timely provision.

Recently I called my best friend in Kansas City and told her about our efforts to raise money for re-doing the Grace parking lot. I told her that our goal was to raise \$200,000 so that this expense wouldn't be included in our church's future mortgage. I shared with her about our progress so far and that I was optimistic that we would reach the financial goal because I know God's generosity and the generosity of the people of Grace. The next morning, she texted me that she had put a check in the mail to Grace to go toward the parking lot project! That financial gift was never my intention; I was simply sharing with my friend about my life, my hopes, my "work." I believe this is how God often works - through our words, our work, our lives, and our sharing of stories. And so, I wonder, where have you seen God this week, and who will you tell?

A GLAD AND GENEROUS HEART

Our Grace Church giving envelope reminds us that 'God loves a cheerful giver' (II Cor. 9:7). Psalm 112:5 indicates that Good will come to those who are generous and lend freely.

So, the age-old chicken and the egg question: which comes first the gladness or the generosity? Does a "glad heart" foster "generosity" or does "giving generously" assure a "glad heart"?

Circumstances should not decide whether we are glad or generous. My mother is an example of this. Using a wringer washer and galvanized tubs, she washed clothes for 8 people every Monday, hung them out to dry and then on Tuesday she "sprinkled them" so that they were damp enough to iron. This is not a recipe for a glad heart; however, my mom chose to be joyful, and we would hear her whistling and singing while she worked (in an unairconditioned home in South Texas).



We lived on a cotton farm and though we did not have monetary wealth our lives were **full** of giving to others. We hosted many missionaries in our 3-bedroom home and often had our friends over after Sunday night service for my dad's famous burgers.

You see, giving generously does not stem from inherent wealth. It can be rather inexpensive and heartfelt: the gift of time, the gift of really listening, the gift of genuine acceptance of those different than us, the gift of a smile, and the gift of a short note of friendship and understanding.



Giving generously is an act of worship which brings gladness to the heart because all that we have is ultimately God's. I have read and heard so many comments about generosity and its effects on the giver:

- Actor Danny Trejo: Everything good that has happened to me is a result of me helping someone else.
- Karen of Good Bones: When we do something for someone else that is when we are whole.
- Description of Amish Bishop's wife: 'her face was lined with the wisdom and kindness that came from years of serving others.'

So as followers of Jesus and His disciples, we follow Christ's commands and the disciplines of being His disciples. The greatest commandment of all from Mark 12:30-31 asks us to: Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul and with all your mind and your neighbor as yourself.

My dear fellow Christians, this is not an option, it is a command. How does that look in our daily walk? This is an outflow of grace and love emanating from us to all around us. As Christ demonstrated inclusive grace and generosity towards us, we should be full of grace and generosity to everyone we encounter in our everyday walk. We are invited to consider if we can selflessly give more of our time and our finances to the advancement of the Gospel.

Disclaimer: Even with careful and thoughtful self-talk about being "glad and generous," at times our mental health will hamper our spirit of service and generosity. In these instances, we may need the intervention of medical specialists and medication.

HEART-FELT THANKS FROM RAKAI, UGANDA!

Our Grace Lutheran congregation has supported many ministries of African Children Today (ACT) in Rakai, Uganda, for over ten years. In this region devastated by HIV/AIDS, we have financially helped the people build a bakery, schools, a health clinic, a poultry operation, and school dormitories.

Perhaps the largest impact Grace has made in Rakai is through the sponsorship of more than 100 children attending the ACT Schools, which teach children Christian values while giving them a world-class education. The on-going correspondence of letters and photos between students and their sponsors has promoted rich, loving relationships over the years.

Several of the Grace-sponsored students have completed training programs to work in construction, mechanics and elementary teacher-training programs. This year, there are nine students who have graduated from ACT High School, passed their national exams, and are now enrolled in university to study and become engineers, accountants, nurses, and secondary teachers. One of these students, Resty Nakasagga, recently wrote to one of her cosponsors, "I thank you for choosing me as your new daughter and making a great decision to support my academics. May God richly Bless You! I had lost hope of joining university because my family is unable to support me. You have now restored a big hope, and I see a bright future ahead!"

For several years, Resty has been sponsored by Chuck and Diane Phillips. Now, they are joined by Doris and Lloyd Wang and Vickie Meade in co-sponsoring Resty during her studies at the university level. Diane and Chuck Phillips noted that "It has been such a joy to watch Resty grow into a beautiful young woman! Her letters have always been filled with so much love and gratitude. She works hard and we are excited to see what she will become!" Vickie Meade shared that "I am pleased to be a co-sponsor of Resty along with others from Grace so that Resty can pursue her dream of becoming a high school teacher. Resty is excited to be at university and one day will be giving back to her community and educating vulnerable children." Doris and Lloyd Wang explained their support saying, "There is much evidence to show that education plays a significant role in breaking the cycle of generational poverty, yet it is often the condition of poverty that prevents individuals from attaining their educational goals. It is a privilege to provide financial support for Resty to study at university so she can be qualified to teach high school in her community."
