What Gives You Hope?

In the early years of my ministry receiving a phone call to come to the side of someone who is dying was one of my worst fears. I felt incredible pressure to come and sit by someone and provide answers or hope, something that I felt was beyond my scope of knowledge or power. But in the last few years, although these phone calls are still dreaded because they usually come alongside a beloved member of our community of faith, I don't fear the visit but instead feel incredible privilege and hope.

Unfortunately, in the last year we have buried too many beloved saints at Grace. Some saints who have been here a long time, some not quite as long, but long enough to make an impact on our community, and long enough that I have formed a close bond with these individuals. I have come to the bedside, sat with family members, and had real conversations about life, about death, about God, about faith.

God is with us in the darkness. God shows up in the tears and turns our mourning into dancing.



I confess that I don't have the answers about what comes next. When asked; I admit they will know before I do what it is like to be held in God's grace. And then I talk about the hope I see. The beauty of the ways God shows up in the darkest hour. The love that I have seen poured out as feet are rubbed and bedding is changed. The abundance of desserts that arrive at Grace before a funeral to make sure that everyone gets to walk away with sweetness on their lips. Paul is clear in his writing to the Romans "..that we do not hope for what we see but we hope for what we do not see and wait with eager longing."—Romans 8:25–26. Isaiah writes, "I will wait for the Lord, and I will hope in God."—Isaiah 8:17 This is where my hope lies. Not in someone miraculously overcoming a disease or illness, but in God who works in and through us, in life and in death. The promises of God are abundant and also, they don't free us from darkness or death but instead remind us that God is with us in the waiting. God is with us in the darkness. God shows up in the tears and turns our mourning into dancing.

As we turn the calendar page, awaiting Advent and Christmas, darkness will descend. Days will be shorter; nights will be longer. Bitter winds will hit us. As all of this happens, we will gather in the warmth of our church, in our homes, and with friends. We will light candles, and put up decorations, we will wait, and we will re-tell the pivotal story of our faith. "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light and on them light shined."—Isaiah 9:2 "The Word became flesh and lived among them."—John 1:14 Angels and messengers will come to Mary, Joseph and the shepherds bringing both confusing and joy-filled news that a Savior will be born to us not just for some but for all.



It is a story about living through the worst of times and knowing that we have a God who doesn't let us sit alone in darkness, but shows up in the hard questions, who shows up in both life and death. Who is willing to hold our hands when we are hurting and who promises something beyond what we can understand in this time and place.


















For Those Who Walked With Us

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"What Gives You Hope Especially During Times of Waiting?"

When presented with this question, I think back to my personal experience when my life took a drastic turn and spiraled downhill. Due to a career change, my wife, Patricia, and I said goodbye to our friends and family and moved from Wisconsin to Andover, Minnesota looking for a fresh start in July 2013. Little did I know that my entire life would turn upside down just 5 months later.

On December 31, 2013, at 5am, my wife woke me up in a panic. At the time, she was undiagnosed with bipolar schizophrenia meaning she was hearing voices. The voices told her to end her life; so, she did, right in front of me while severely injuring me in the process. A week after she passed and my reconstructive surgery, I returned to an empty home with no friends, no family and two dogs who were dying of bone cancer. As if that wasn't enough, Patricia's family blamed me for her death and shut me out. I was crippled with sadness, lost, and I faced planning her funeral alone with no financial means or assistance. I yearned to find hope in a space in time where I felt alone.

God never gave up on me. Unexpectedly, caring people and healing opportunities filled my life. As such, I started to embrace that hope and faith were intertwined.

...what gave me hope through the storm? In a word...GOD.

After my surgery, I received a visit from a hospital clergy who talked to me about grief counseling, which I attended for my mental health. I chose Grace Lutheran to worship. Here, I learned about and attended GriefShare - which significantly aided in my spiritual healing. I had meaningful conversations with the practicing pastor. I met new people at Grace who have become life-long friends. Faith over fear became my mantra. Four years later, I met Dani, we married in 2021, and I gained an amazing stepson in Isaac.

My life was battered and beaten, but hope pushed me through to the amazing life I have now. I am truly blessed. I am now giving back as a GriefShare facilitator. So, what gave me hope through the storm? In a word...GOD. He was always with me even if I didn't see it at the time.

"Dear God, I humbly ask that you give me hope. With everything going on in my life, I feel lost. I know and believe that you Lord, are the hope for the hopeless. I can't do this on my own; I need you. Please help me keep my eyes on you and not my problems. Be my light when I am weak. Father, give me patience and hope for the future. Remind me you are with me and still in control. Thank you for all you do for me. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen." – The Graceful Chapter

HEALTHY OUTCOMES FROM POSITIVE EXPERIENCES

In September, I met with clergy who lead in congregations that belong to Mental Health Connect. We use this every-other-month meeting to connect with one another, to share ideas about mental health ministry, share about our own mental health, and the mental health of our congregations. We also spend part of our time learning. This time we heard a presentation on H.O.P.E. (Healthy Outcomes from Positive Experiences).

In 1998 the original study on ACEs or Adverse Childhood Experiences was published. It showed that exposure to adversity in childhood had lasting impact on the brain and body. Abuse, substance use, divorce, mental illness of a parent, incarceration of a parent, immigration, neglect, bullying, community crime, homelessness, etc. are all examples of ACEs that cause toxic stress and have harmful outcomes on children even as they become adults.

H.O.P.E. or Healthy Outcomes from Positive Experiences emphasizes the importance of positive experiences. PCEs (Positive Childhood Experiences) can positively influence development even in the presence of ACEs (Adverse Childhood Experiences).

What does this have to do with Grace and where do I see hope?

The four building blocks of HOPE are:

- -Safe and supportive relationships
- -Safe, stable, equitable environments
- -Opportunities for engagement
- -Opportunities for emotional growth

I see Grace as a community offering many PCEs. Churches are uniquely situated to support families and communities because we are based in traditions of meaning making, we are intergenerational in nature - connecting children with many caring adults and support systems beyond a family unit. I have seen this especially on Wednesday nights at Grace and even more on our faith fundamentals nights where we all gather together to learn core tenants of our faith and traditions. It is safe and supportive with opportunities for engagement and growth. And I don't just experience this on Wednesday but Sundays too and at special events. Thank you, people of Grace, for providing safe, supportive, and equitable environments for engagement and growth- healing and wholeness as we live out the Christmas Gospel-Jesus-God incarnate, in the flesh, Emmanuel, God is with us.
