When our kids were young, we had the most dandelions in our neighborhood. We didn't want to use pesticides that might blow into our house and affect our kids. I remember trying to dig them out with a special tool, only to almost reach the entire root and have it break at the bottom. Eventually, I just gave up. Dandelions are quite beautiful for a time. Their yellow blossoms brighten the lawn and bring new life.



However, my dandelion garden drove one of my neighbors crazy. For good reason, really—a strong wind would blow the seeds far beyond my yard and into the neighborhood. This neighbor was also a master gardener and a retired business owner of a landscaping company. Every summer, touring groups would visit his garden, while there I was on the corner, sending my dandelion seeds into the wind.



But my daughters delighted in the dandelions. I remember many vases on my kitchen counter, filled with the flowers picked by their small hands, presented with love. I did the same thing for my mom when I was a child—gifting her a sweaty fistful of dandelions. Of course, those dandelions would wilt quickly, and in our yard, they would eventually go to seed. As a child, I was quick to pick them and blow, watching the dazzling seeds dance in the wind. Yes, I was that kind of kid—and so were my children.

I think there's a reason Jesus tells us to have the faith of a child. It's not just about wondering or believing; it's about delighting in the world around us. Children don't see dandelions as weeds; they see them as something more beautiful. They are gifts for parents, wishes waiting to be made, and flowers that make the yard more vibrant. Their roots run deep, and instead of cursing them as adults do when striving for a pristine yard, we can rejoice that these yellow blossoms will return year after year.

The Easter story begins in a tomb, amidst despair and grief. It is here that Mary Magdalene, Joanna, and Mary the mother of James encounter Jesus. Before long, this "idle tale" would work its way from community to community, reaching far beyond anyone's expectations. New life, new hope, wishes, and weeds—this is what God does for us. God changes our perspective, opens our eyes, and allows us to see more than we ever thought possible.

It's been a long time since I picked a dandelion and blew its seeds into the world. It's probably a good thing—my neighbors wouldn't appreciate it, even now. And yet, I believe God invites us to share the Gospel in abundance. God calls us to delight with the gleeful energy of a child, to see the dandelions not as weeds, but as something beautiful—a gift to be shared, where love can spread, and hope can grow.

When I reflect on my volunteering experiences, I often recall the numerous times I assisted at my children's elementary school for classroom celebrations, field trips, and P.T.A. events. Throughout their various activities, there were always requests for volunteers for tournaments, team parents, concession stand duties, and fundraisers. I also remember the countless hours spent carpooling my kids to Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, soccer, football, softball, baseball, basketball, wrestling, lacrosse, and choir. Carpooling was truly what I cherished the most. As the kids piled into the car, conversations began about crushes, favorite and least favorite teachers, coaches, and whether certain kids seemed to receive special treatment. I would simply sit back and drive, relishing in hearing about their achievements, struggles, heartaches, and family dynamics. Some kids would often ask, "Mom K., what do you think?" I aimed to remain neutral and positive, offering general advice to avoid stepping on another parent's toes. Once the kids got their driver's licenses, my carpooling days came to an end, and I must admit I felt a bit adrift. Although I appreciated not having to drive at all hours to drop off or pick up a child-especially with the logistics of two kids in sports and a husband who served as a sheriff's deputy—I still missed that special time spent in the car with my kids and their friends.

I explored various volunteer opportunities, including Discover Anoka, United Way, and Backing the Blue Line. However, none of these experiences sparked an emotional connection, soothed my heart, or eased my feelings of empty nest syndrome.



Then my husband and I came across Grace Lutheran Church. We enjoyed attending services, bringing our children when they were home from school, and even inviting my mom to join us. One Sunday, during the blessing of the quilts destined for Rakai, my husband turned to me and said, "Hey, I wonder if you'd be interested in that?" Intrigued, I looked into it and discovered an evening quilting group. I decided to check it out, and that was eight years ago.

Today, I still create quilt toppers for the Rakai quilting group during my crafting time at home. This fulfilling experience inspired me to take on the role of organizing communion set-up and clean-up, which I now lead. This volunteer work has allowed me to utilize my skills in sewing, quilting, organization, cleaning, and working behind the scenes. It has also given me a renewed sense of purpose as my children have grown. Now, I have something that is uniquely mine. I find joy in following in the footsteps of my beloved Aunt Millie, who embodied the essence of the cherished Lutheran church basement lady.



In January 2020, the Sunday bulletins featured an announcement for a part-time bookkeeper position. Upon first reading it, I took a moment to reflect. I contemplated it, prayed about it, and wrestled with the decision.

The following Sunday, the job listing appeared again. I delved into the job description and realized I had experience in similar roles throughout my career. I considered how this opportunity would impact my cleaning business, prayed once more, and continued to wrestle with my thoughts. That Saturday evening, I discussed the opportunity with my husband. I shared that after 12 years of cleaning homes, I felt exhausted and was ready to gradually retire from that work. His first question was, "What will you do instead of cleaning?" I mentioned the bulletin article from the previous week. He inquired, "Do you think you would enjoy it there?" since he had heard that working in a church could be exhausting. I replied that every time I volunteered or participated in church activities, it had been a wonderful experience. He then asked if the position was still available. I wasn't certain, but I figured if the article appeared in this week's bulletin, it was a sign for me to apply. And it was! I submitted my application and was hired as the bookkeeper at Grace, working 12 hours a week. Over the past five years, I have transitioned into the role of communications and volunteer coordinator, working Monday through Thursday. I have fully retired from house cleaning and cherish every moment in my position at Grace.

Being Alive "Do This and You Will Live"

Over five years ago I helped start the Mental Health Team at Grace because I thought that it was (and is) important for people of faith to learn about mental health and to become comfortable having conversations about mental health both within our faith community as well as outside of our church. I also have a passion for thinking and talking about concepts not covered in worship or that may seem taboo in some churches like wellness, healing, wholeness, wayfinding, and more. Recently I realized that for the past three years I have been on a journey of healing and wholeness following the unexpected loss of my mother. It was a season of intense loss and pain and also a time of intense searching for how I want to live my life.

At the beginning of Lent this year, Pastor Joanna preached on Luke 10. You may remember the text and sermon about the lawyer, the Good Samaritan, and the sisters, Mary and Martha. One of the verses that remains is Jesus' answer to the lawyer who asked him what he must do to receive eternal life. Pastor Joanna pointed out Jesus' reply wasn't about how to receive eternal life but, rather, Jesus told the lawyer in verse 28, "Do this and you will live."



I wonder at times, "wouldn't it be great to have Jesus point the way and tell us what we need to do to live?" Do you ever wonder how best to live or how God wants you to live? Maybe like me, you are experiencing a hard season in life and wondering what you must do to feel alive again. This idea of being alive is a key question in the Bible and in life itself. The questions of "how should I live" and "what do I do to be alive?" lead me to discernment.



According to the dictionary, discernment means:

- 1. The ability to judge well;
- 2.(In Christian contexts) perception in the absence of judgment with a view to obtaining spiritual guidance and understanding.

I don't love the word discernment because it can seem too "churchy" and yet I think it is the right word to describe what is needed. How am I to live? How are we to live in this time and place?

May is national mental health awareness month. In the context of mental health and in the spirit of having a conversation that perhaps we haven't had before at church, I ask:

- What makes you feel alive?
- When do you feel energized or surprisingly full of energy?
- When or where do you feel love, acceptance, and belonging?
- What inspires you?
- What is the next right thing for you to do?

In conclusion, I want to share one of my favorite quotes which is from the 20th century author and theologian, Howard Thurman: "Don't ask what the world needs. Ask what makes you come alive, and go do it. Because what the world needs is people who have come alive."

As we move forward, let's not let this transformation stop here. Just as the world around us awakens in spring—the budding trees, the blooming flowers, the fresh signs of life—let these be reminders that God is calling us to continue growing. Transformation isn't a one-time event; it's an ongoing process.

So, I invite you to take this season as an opportunity to lean into growth. Spend time in prayer. Listen for how God is calling you to stretch. Say yes to something new—whether it's signing up for a class, joining a ministry, committing to that mission trip you've been considering, or deepening your personal faith practice.
