





Christmas Wonder

Christmas has always been a source of wonder for me. My earliest memories include the wonder of seeing lights twinkling on the Christmas tree, the wonder of running outdoors on cold winter nights searching for the North Star above the barn on our farm (in my childhood I thought the North star was the Bethlehem star), the wonder of lighting the Advent Wreath, the wonder of singing Silent Night while lighting candles during a Candlelight Service.



The very first singing of Silent Night was on Christmas Eve in 1818, accompanied by a guitar (and from a guitarist point of view the instrument was a very good choice!) due to the church organ being broken. My earliest childhood memories of Christmas also include music and singing. Singing in our church Children's Program, of gathering around to sing carols. To me music has always been so much more than notes and words on paper - music has always spoken to my soul. Singing and music provides joy, a sense of belonging, and of wonder.



So why do we sing Christmas carols? Why lights on the tree? We sing to celebrate the birth of Jesus, to pass on traditions, to create a sense of community, to praise God, to spread light in the darkness of winter. The lights on the tree symbolize the birth of Christ being the light of our world – bringing hope, renewal, and joy!

God's Love and Light does Shine.

We have been walking our dogs in the dark lately. The sun sets too early for us to be able to get them on their much-needed walks in the evening especially because the hour before sunset is filled with way too many dogs for our anxious and highly distractable dogs. The dark is a welcome friend. In the dark, the dogs can't see as far and so don't notice the dog that gives them anxiety a few blocks ahead. We can hide more easily behind cars. But other things are harder. In the dark we worry about getting hit by a car; it's also a lot harder to see the dog droppings we are committed to picking up.

Living in Minnesota, we know darkness well, especially in the winter months. Many of us in December will wake up in the dark and then leave work in the dark. The days are short, and the nights are long. And we learn to walk in darkness. We learn to use the reflection of the snow to find light even in the shadows. We start to pay attention to the stars that light up not only the night but the morning sky.

I cannot tell you how the light comes, but that it does. That it will.

Jan Richardson writes in her blessing: <u>How the light comes</u>: "I cannot tell you how the light comes, but that it does. That it will. That it works its way into the deepest dark that enfolds you, though it may seem long ages in coming or arrive in a shape you do not foresee."


John 1:9 states: "...the true light which enlightens everyone was coming into the world." This is what we wait for during Advent. As the days grow shorter and the night grows longer, we light candles in hope and promise, knowing that the darkness will not last forever. Knowing that soon, the days will start to lengthen.

While creation tells us its own story of light and darkness, so does our world. We see the darkness all around us. Too often, our news is filled with stories of division, of hurt, of pain. We read stories of abuse and cry out for God to bring light to the darkness of those who have suffered. We hear statistics about the rising cost of food, and the housing shortage and feel the darkness of basic needs not being met. And we also light up that darkness. It doesn't take much light for darkness to start to transform. Just a spark, just a candle, just a flash. Bringing light into the darkness can be as simple as sitting by a grieving friend, dropping off food for the food pantry, or listening to someone who is feeling alone.

In the Gospel of John, the author shows us the deep contrast between light and dark. The darkness of sin and death. Those who hide their faith in darkness like Nicodemus who goes asking questions of faith to Jesus under the cover of night and those who are exposed in the daylight like the woman at the well who gets water at noon and isn't afraid to ask hard questions or tell her truth. We will be studying the Gospel of John starting in January. We invite you to a Bible study of John on Wednesdays starting January 7th at 6pm. Together we will consider how God invites us to not only wait for the light, but to receive it by growing in faith, and reflect it as we shine out with God's love in a world that too often feels consumed by darkness.

As we walk through these dark December days, may we trust that the light is coming—both the literal lengthening of days after the solstice and the true light of Christ that enlightens everyone. May we learn to walk confidently in the darkness, knowing we are never alone, and may we become bearers of light to a world that desperately needs it.

This Advent, I invite you to consider how you are reflecting God's light today and how you might invite others to join you. For indeed God's light and God's love does shine!
