

Grace4Rakai

The Grace4Rakai Ministry Team thanks the Grace community for supporting vulnerable children in Rakai, Uganda, with over 100 children benefiting from ACT Schools and university studies. The Amazing Grace Bakery, since 2015, has created jobs for over 40 people and aids ACT schools financially. Contributions include funding dormitories and over 250 quilts from Grace Quilters, highlighting the community's love and impact recognized by the children and local community.

The Grace congregation has supported ministries in Rakai, Uganda, since 2011, starting with two water tanks for a school. They launched a child sponsorship program in 2014 and funded a bakery's construction in 2015, leading to the formation of the Grace4Rakai Ministry Team to support expanding ACT ministries in the region.

CATECHISM FOR LENT: WHAT DOES THIS MEAN?

Last year, we tried something new. Once a month we invited our kids and our adults to join our catechism kids for an evening of learning together. We investigated the Old Testament by sharing our favorite books and discussing the various types of books we encounter in the library of our faith. We made collages in groups when we explored the 10 commandments. We put together intergenerational tables that learned together. It was fun, chaotic, and challenging. At the end, our lament was that there was too much time in between each meeting and we weren't able to have consistent small groups.

One of the unique aspects of being the church is that we are an intergenerational community. We have babies, and elders worshipping side by side, along with kids and teens and middle-aged people and young adults. Often, we end up in age-segmented small groups like Youth Ministry, or Senior Ministry. But we also recognize the great importance of forming relationship across generations and asking big questions of faith together.

Every Lent we change things up and invite people to participate in a new way. Usually this means a special worship series with unique topics during the service. **This year is different - worship stays the same, but we're doing something special outside of worship. Here's what's changing (and what's not):**

- Our worship schedule and sermon topics will remain the same as always—you'll hear familiar Lenten themes on both Wednesdays and Sundays. **What's different is what happens outside of worship.** We're inviting you to join intergenerational faith formation groups where we'll explore Luther's Catechism together. We will be offering opportunities on Sunday mornings (in addition to worship) and on Wednesday nights (separate from our evening service). Sign-up on Realm and join in the fun!
- We know you won't always be in town (Spring Break and schedules in general) but we don't care, we want all people to sign up and join in the fun. We will be examining the following topics: Holy Baptism, Holy Communion, and who is God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit? If it's been a while since you studied this, me too! I would bet you have different questions than you had when you first studied them. Martin Luther invites us to ask the questions: What does this mean?
- In our world today, as faith communities grow smaller and more and more people don't claim to be of faith, it's important for us to wonder together about what does our faith mean. What does our baptism mean when we encounter hatred and division in the world? What does it mean that we are all are invited to the Communion table and that Jesus fed both Judas and Peter and feeds us just as we are? What does it mean to have a creator God in a world that is hurt by floods and fires? What does it mean that the Holy Spirit gives us faith? And how do we follow Jesus and reflect his life in all that we do.

I know that I am the person I am because of the various people who influenced my own faith. I remember being brought to church by my mom and grandma. But I also remember Mr. Olson my 7th grade catechism teacher telling me repeatedly that God is the one who makes the first move in a relationship and God comes to me first in love and in care. I know that our kids and youth and yes, our adults will all learn and discover new things together as we wonder and explore our faith asking: What does this mean? I can't wait to begin the journey with you.

DREAM TEAM

A huge thank you to everyone who completed the Dream Team survey. We had 244 responses and wow, what amazing responses they were!

As a part of our preparation and study for this process, we have been meditating on the woman at the well, John 4: 4-42. When we think about this story, several narratives may come to mind.

- The significance of a Jew talking to a Samaritan,
- A woman talking to a man,
- A woman who seems to be on the margins, “not acceptable”, talking to Jesus.

Jesus chooses this person to reveal himself as the Messiah for the first time. What an awesome responsibility for this woman to share with her Samaritan neighbors! However, as we read more deeply, it is a lesson in how to listen deeply, ask tough questions and have compassion and trust someone who is “other” than us. Jesus takes time to sit with her. She shares concerns about the lines that have been drawn between them and is not afraid to challenge Him. He hears her and doesn’t shy away. He acknowledges the division, hurt, and shares a vision for how their world can be different. We encourage you to read this passage and meditate on it.



Grounded in this idea of deep listening, the team is beginning the process of reviewing the answers to the survey and identify themes to help us process the information we received. Some of the themes that resonated most with me are:

- How Grace has supported you in times of life transition
- The inclusivity and welcome that Grace extends to the community
- The generosity of this congregation
- The struggle we are all feeling in our world today (financial, violence, intolerance, division, etc.)

We will unpack these themes and others, as our next steps include developing some listening sessions. These will be facilitated discussions, and we want as many people to participate as possible. Yes, even if you did not complete the survey, you are welcome!

So, plan to participate, make your voice heard! More information will be coming out soon!

The mission of Alexandra House is to empower victims of domestic and sexual violence, and inspire social change through education, support, and advocacy. Alexandra House offers a full continuum of services including an emergency shelter, housing and support services, hospital advocacy, legal advocacy, safety planning and support groups. One of their newer services is "Linus' Pet Haven" for individuals who need housing services and have a pet they do not wish to leave behind.

Dave and I have attended the past three Hope Galas, and each time we have been inspired by the messages shared by the keynote speakers who are victims of domestic violence and by the attendance of so many community members. In the past, participants from Grace have filled one table at the Gala and our hope this year is to fill two tables.

STRENGTHENING WORSHIP THROUGH INTENTIONAL CHANGES

Have you noticed the changes? Whether you attend Sunday morning or Wednesday evening worship, you may have sensed something a little different. Throughout 2025, our music director, David Phelps, has been working with our staff to thoughtfully enhance our worship experience. These changes are not about doing something new for the sake of change, but about deepening our shared worship—creating services that flow more naturally, feel more welcoming, and invite fuller participation from everyone. Below is a brief overview of what has been implemented and the heart behind these decisions.

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8:30am Service: Rooted and Reflective

At the 8:30am service, we have been intentionally reconnecting with elements of historic liturgy while maintaining a warm and accessible worship experience. Portions of the liturgy, including the Kyrie, Hymn of Praise, and familiar service music, help ground our worship in a shared rhythm of confession, praise, and thanksgiving.

When Communion is celebrated, the generosity moment now follows Communion, allowing the sacrament to remain uninterrupted. Announcements have been moved to the end of the service so important information is not missed, and additional musical generosity moments invite reflection on God's abundant grace.

10:15am Service: Flow and Invitation

The 10:15am service has also seen intentional changes to improve flow and create a more immersive worship experience. Music now begins before the formal call to worship, helping set a prayerful tone, and the worship leader guides the opening welcome and prayer for smoother transitions.

Following the sermon, a pastoral prayer is offered as the band prepares, maintaining a reflective atmosphere. Every fourth Sunday, Hear Our Prayer is sung during the Prayers of the Church, inviting musical participation. As with the 8:30am service, generosity moments are supported by music, announcements come at the end, and the blessing is shared during the final song as a sending into the world.

Wednesday Worship: Creative and Communal

Wednesday worship mirrors the flow of the 10:15am service while allowing space for creativity and participation. Each week features a different form of the Prayers of the Church, including spoken, sung, and interactive prayer, inviting meaningful congregational engagement.

Every second Wednesday, we sing a Song of Confession written by Pastor Joanna Mitchell and David Phelps, and each week we sing the Lord's Prayer—an intentional distinction from Sunday worship that reinforces our unity in prayer.



Moving Forward Together

All of these changes reflect a shared desire to be more intentional in our worship—attending to flow, participation, and the ways music and prayer shape our experience of God. We are grateful for the leadership of our pastors and David Phelps, and for a congregation that remains open and engaged as we continue to grow together in worship, grounded in tradition and attentive to the Spirit's leading.
